# POST EXHIBITION - HILL 60 PORT KEMBLA CROWN RESERVE PLAN OF MANAGEMENT

On 6 May 2024, Council resolved to seek approval from the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure – Crown Lands to exhibit the draft Plan of Management (draft PoM) for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344) for public comment. On 26 March 2025, Council received approval for the exhibition of the draft Plan of Management which occurred from 3 July 2025 to 1 September 2025 and resulted in 18 submissions being received.

The draft PoM sets out the framework for consideration of potential uses, development (including related potential leases or licences) as required under the *Crown Land Management Act 2016* for Crown community land. Decisions specific to the use, development and management of Hill 60 Crown Reserve, while needing to be consistent with the Plan of Management, are progressed through separate processes.

Following consideration of the submissions received, it is recommended that Council endorse an amended draft PoM (Attachment 3) and seek the Minister's consent to adopt the amended PoM under the Crown Land Management Regulation 2018.

#### RECOMMENDATION

- 1 The amended draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344) (Attachments 3 and 4), be endorsed and referred to the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure Crown Lands as a delegate for the Minister to obtain consent to adopt the amended Plan of Management under clause 70B of the *Crown Land Management Regulation 2018*.
- 2 If consent to adopt the Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344) is granted by Crown Lands, the General Manager be delegated authority to adopt the Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344) as approved under clause 70B of the *Crown Land Management Regulation 2018* pursuant to section 40 of the *Local Government Act 1993* and in accordance with section 3.23(6) of the *Crown Land Management Act 2016*.
- Once adopted, a copy of the adopted Plan of Management be forwarded to the Department of Planning, Housing, and Infrastructure Crown Lands and placed on Council's website.

#### **BACKGROUND**

#### Hill 60 Crown Reserve PoM Area

Hill 60 Crown Reserve Number 97344 is located on the headland at Hill 60 in Port Kembla (Attachment 1). The Reserve was gazetted on 6 July 1984 for the purpose of Public Recreation. The Reserve consists of three lots – Lots 1, 3 DP 531524 and Lot 1 DP 614555. The Reserve includes the pathway to Fisherman's Beach but does not include the sandy beach area subject to wave action. The PoM area is accessed via Military Road and Gloucester Boulevard by vehicle and by the Ngaraba-Aan Cultural Trail on foot.

The Reserve is zoned RE1 Public Recreation under the Wollongong Local Environment Plan (LEP) 2009. The PoM area does not include the small portion of Council owned community land (Lot 3 DP 86079) adjoining Gloucester Boulevard. This land is separately covered under Council's Community Land Plan of Management 2022.

#### Plan of Management (PoM)

A PoM guides management, development, and use of a Crown Reserve in accordance with its public purpose or purposes. The application of community land categories available under the Local Government Act 1993 (i.e. park, sportsground, general community use, natural area, and area of cultural significance) sets core objectives to further inform uses and leasing / licencing activities.

A PoM also nominates permissible uses and developments which are consistent with the reserve purpose(s) and the community land category. Other processes are in place to consider specific decisions that relate to the future development or use of reserves. The preparation of a PoM for community land is an additional requirement that does not apply to privately owned land. Any development proposals on community land (as on privately owned land) need to be permissible through the land zoning land use table of the Wollongong LEP 2009, or through a State Environmental Planning Policy.

A use being permissible under a PoM, does not commit Council to any development or investment in a particular Crown reserve or Council owned community land area, but it enables consideration of the identified possible uses, developments and related possible tenures subject to relevant processes. A PoM is not intended to pre-empt future considerations of Council in relation to the allocation of resources.



# Council Resolution of 6 May 2024 - Draft Plan of Management for Hil 60 Crown Reserve (97344)

On 6 May 2024 Council considered a report on the draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344). The Draft PoM includes the following five (5) aims-

- 1 To demonstrate legislative compliance with the PoM making provisions of the CLM Act 2016.
- 2 To set the framework for management and use of the reserve (by Council and by others) to be compliant with any applicable legislation that may apply to any PoM permitted future uses, developments and activities including issuing tenure agreements.
- 3 To continue to implement the Hill 60 Landscape Masterplan into the future so that more people know that this recreational land -
  - Has cultural significance for Aboriginal people for its past, present and future.
  - Has an extensive network of built forms from the WWII era.
  - Supports terrestrial and marine intertidal biodiversity values including native vegetation, beach and rocky shores.
  - Provides potential habitat for a range of native terrestrial and marine flora and fauna species, including threatened species.
- 4 To make the public aware that the area presents real hazards that are to be managed by the individual visitors to the reserve by their own choices related to their own actions because
  - Hill 60 is a place where 6 rock fishers have drowned between 2021 and 2024.
  - Fishermans Beach is not a patrolled beach.
  - There is no development consent or licence agreement for use of the glider take-off point on the headland or for the landing area at Fisherman's Beach. This is in contrast to the way this use is regulated by Council at Bald Hill Lookout and Bell's Point in Austinmer.
  - Council has attempted to close the entrance to the military tunnels because it is not safe for the public to enter the tunnels in their current state.
- 5 To make people aware the area has environmental values that support frog habitat, native vegetation and biodiversity. Council supports these values by the current practices of -
  - Weed management by aerial and other methods.
  - Involving the Aboriginal community in developing and implementing Vegetation Management Plans for areas that are of cultural significance to their community.
  - Careful and deliberate application of Asset Protection Zones for existing Council assets on the land that seek to address bushfire mitigation in a way that will have least impact on biodiversity and Aboriginal cultural values.

# Council resolved that:

- 1 The draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve, Port Kembla be referred to the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure –Crown Lands:
  - a As the landowner, as required by section 39 of the Local Government Act 1993
  - b For Ministerial consent to exhibit the draft Plan of Management as required by clause 70B of the Crown Land Management Regulation 2018; and
- 2 Following the receipt of approval by the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure Crown Lands as landowner and the Minister's consent, the draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve be exhibited for a minimum period of 42 days.
- 3 A further report be submitted to Council on the community feedback received following the exhibition period.

On 7 June 2024, the Draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Crown Reserve (97344) was referred to Crown Lands as resolved by Council as noted above.



# Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan

As noted by draft PoM Aim 3, implementing the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan will continue as legislative approvals allow and resources are allocated through separate processes into the future.

The Landscape Master Plan applies to a much larger coastal area – extending to MM beach to the north and along the coastal edge near (but not including) the Port Kembla Pool to the south. An important Headland Precinct Accessible Viewing Project was completed in the PoM area by December 2024 in line with legislative approvals granted in 2021.

Accessible Viewing Area Project – Hill 60 Landscape Masterplan Implementation within the PoM Area Council worked with the community and completed the following improvements by December 2024:

- Rebuilding the existing access road and carpark to create a new accessible viewing area with pedestrian access and accessible car parking.
- New kerbs and equal access footway connections up to the new high quality concrete viewing area, along with new safety railings around the viewing area and new bench seating.
- The large, pedestrian-friendly viewing area celebrates the expansive views of Fishermans Beach and the Five Islands and the rich history of the site with new interpretative signage and artwork created collaboratively.
  - The signage includes QR codes linking visitor smart phones to the Illawarra Stories website where stories told by Aboriginal Traditional Owners, custodians and knowledge holders connected to Hill 60 have been compiled to be easily shared.
  - o The artwork "Hill 60 Dreaming' by Uncle Steven Russell offers another view of the story of this significant headland and is a key feature of the viewing area.

Legislative Approvals to Implement the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan

The Landscape Master Plan works completed in 2024 were undertaken in accordance with approvals granted in 2021. These 2021 approvals – an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) and a Heritage Act 1977 approval – are both conditioned by the Hill 60 Conservation Management Plan as approved by the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water – Heritage NSW. The Conservation Management Plan sets conservation policies and procedures to protect both the area's Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal cultural and heritage values. During the exhibition period, DCCEEW supported the plan of management. This support is discussed later in the report.

# Existing and new possible tenures, uses and developments under the PoM

Under the draft PoM, Council can consider granting tenures over the land for existing and future Master Plan related uses and developments, subject to compliance to all applicable legislation. Existing tenures include the Marine Rescue – Port Kembla Licence and the use of some of the PoM area for Illawarra Triathlon Club events 1 day a month during the triathlon season.

Some possible future licences through the PoM are listed below -

- Granting a licence for a future coffee van or mobile food truck in a dedicated parking spot.
- If there were appropriate short term filming proposals, it would be possible to consider granting a licence under the PoM, subject to legislative compliance.
  - o Appropriate or suitable filming which has minimal impact upon the environment and locality.
  - Consultation with the Aboriginal community would be part of Council's assessment of "suitable" filming.
- Consistent with Council requirements for hang gliding and para gliding at Bald Hill, the draft PoM requires gliding activities to obtain development consent and a licence agreement.
- Granting a licence for appropriate adaptive re-use of the military tunnels pending further investigations regarding make safe options and other processes of Council.
  - Periodic use for heritage tours or filming related to historic or cultural values is suggested as in keeping with the special limitations on the land.



- Using the tunnels for a more intensive, regular use (for example recreational or tourist related use) would need to be sympathetic to the area's protected status under the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 and the Heritage Act 1977 and the Crown Reserve's Public Recreation purpose.
  - Until further investigations and other processes of Council are undertaken that result in a
    detailed adaptive re-use proposal to assess for legislative compliance, it is not possible to
    determine what adaptive re-use may occur on site in specific terms.
  - It would also be contingent on Council's ability to secure resources to progress and assess potential adaptive re uses.

# Legislative compliance

Legislative compliance is an ongoing complex matter dependent on the location and type of activity or development or proposed tenure. The legislation which applies to land under the draft PoM includes, but is not limited to -

- The Native Title Act 1993 (Commonwealth Legislation).
- The NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983.
- The NSW Local Government Act 1993.
- The National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974.
- The Heritage Act 1977.
- The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979.
- Wollongong LEP 2009.

For any possible use, development, management strategy or tenure under the draft PoM, it is only permissible to the extent that legislative compliance can be demonstrated.

# Review by Crown Lands - Authority to Exhibit - Inclusion of May 2025 Gazettal in PoM

The review of the draft plan by Crown Lands occurred between June 2024 and March 2025. In March 2025, Crown Lands issued authority to exhibit the draft PoM with a requirement to include a planned Departmental gazettal of an "additional reserve purpose". On 23 May 2025 the Minister for Lands and Property gazetted an additional reserve purpose "Community Purposes" pursuant to section 2.14 of the Crown Land Management Act 2016 to the existing Marine Rescue — Port Kembla licence area. This additional purpose enables Council to consider granting a new tenure agreement to Marine Rescue under the draft Plan of Management. The "public recreation" public purpose remains across the entire Crown reserve, hence "Community Purposes" is the "additional" public purpose in terms of the CLM Act 2016.

The draft PoM was exhibited from 3 July 2025 to 1 September 2025 (60 days). The exhibition process resulted in 18 submissions (1 Government Department, 2 Community Organisations and 15 individuals). The sentiment from submissions included support for the PoM and suggestions for improvements within the area (which were outside the scope of the PoM).

The Consultation and Communication section of this report describes the steps taken to obtain the community's views on the draft PoM documents. The Proposal section of this report addresses how the community feedback was considered.

#### **PROPOSAL**

This report details the results of the public exhibition and comment period for the draft PoM and proposes to make minor updates to the exhibited draft PoM following staff's consideration of feedback received on the draft PoM documents. Generally speaking, the draft PoM was supported so only minor updates are proposed in response to the community's feedback. A Summary of Submissions document (Attachment 2) provides more details regarding each submission received by Council on the plan of management.



This section of the report provides a broad summary starting with the feedback provided by the DCCEEW who play an integral role in supporting the protection, conservation and management of both Aboriginal cultural heritage and environmental heritage through their administration of the Heritage Act 1977 and key parts of the National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974.

#### Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water – Heritage NSW

DCCEEW identified the area's cultural and natural values and Council's existing approved plans (the Landscape Masterplan, Vegetation Management Plan, Conservation Management Plan and Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit for example) when stating "we have no major concerns with the draft plan". DCCEEW also noted the requirement for actions under the plan to be consistent with the CMP and AHIP and the process for amending these, if necessary, in the future.

#### Response:

The PoM as exhibited permits possible activities, developments and related tenures only to the extent legislative compliance can be obtained. Reference to the existing 2021 approvals are made throughout the document, and the PoM appendix includes many extracts from the CMP document. An additional reference to the Heritage Act 1977 on page 9 has been added as shown in yellow highlight in the Updated draft Plan of Management for Hill 60 Reserve (97344) Document (Attachment 3).

#### **Community Organisations**

The *Illawarra Triathlon Club* requested that Council consider updating the Plan of Management with more information regarding the most current development consent for the seasonal triathlon events run by the organisation and asking for clarification on how best to meet requirements in relation to having a booking and a licence for the use of the area (conditions 8 and 9 of development consent DA-2015/1106/E) in the future under the plan of management.

# Response:

Use of the PoM area is to comply with the PoM and any applicable legislative approvals such as DA-2015/1106/E for Triathlon events within the PoM area. Additional explanatory text has been added as shown in yellow highlight on page 29 to provide clarification on the matters raised by the club, providing options to consider subject to separate processes of Council that enable the same limited triathlon event use, but through either an annual licence or a longer tenure term. Currently, the Club enters into a Section 2.20 CLM Act Licence annually before the start of the season. A longer tenure term for same seasonal use could be considered.

Neighbourhood Forum 7 provided feedback that the draft Plan of Management lacked detail on WWII Military era assets with PoM area and more conservation actions were required to safeguard WWII era assets within the PoM area and along the larger Hill 60 precinct.

# Response:

The Hill 60 Conservation Management Plan is a comprehensive document guiding asset management within the larger Hill 60 precinct that includes the State Heritage Register Listed Hill 60 / Illowra Battery (SHR 01492). Through the 600-page CMP all types of cultural and heritage values are protected including WWII military era improvements above and below ground. The CMP is the appropriate document to address the conservation of the area's heritage assets and is referenced in the PoM.

#### **Individual Submissions**

Council received fifteen (15) submissions from individuals. Each individual submission is provided in more detail in the Summary of Submissions (Attachment 2) to this report. Individuals were supportive of Council recent improvements on the headland (accessible viewing platform project), desired more improvements to continue in keeping with the 2015 Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan and many appreciated that the area had natural environmental attributes to retain, particularly Fishermans Beach. More walking and cycling trail improvements were desired over more car related improvements by some submitters.



Through all the submissions received, it was clear the community values Hill 60 and wants to continue working together to care for this significant area, telling its story and appreciating its coastal environment by continued implementation of the Hill 60 Landscape Masterplan, in accordance with the CMP. Many mentioned creating a way to have safe public access to the tunnels as a priority.

#### Response:

No changes to the PoM have been proposed in relation to individual submissions as generally speaking the PoM permits improvements requested in individual submissions, subject to other processes of Council. A PoM does not allocate Council resources.

The updated Draft Plan of Management (Attachment 3) and the updated Draft PoM Appendix document (Attachment 4) use highlighted yellow text to show where changes are proposed in light of consideration of the results of the public exhibition and comment period.

Some changes proposed have been made to reflect Council's adoption of Our Wollongong Our Future 2035 goals instead of Our Wollongong Our Future 2025 goals and to make other similar updates to referenced Council policies. Corrections in relation to formatting, grammar, spelling and how the existing development consent for triathlon activities is referenced have been proposed.

None of the proposed amendments change the aims or intent of the plan of management from what was exhibited. The community land categories applied to the land remain as exhibited, noting that the majority of the plan of management area remains categorised as an area of cultural significance. The draft plan of management as amended in Attachments 3 and 4 is suitable for consideration for referral back to Crown Lands and adoption as per the recommendations section of this report.

#### CONSULTATION AND COMMUNICATION

Council carried out a variety of engagement activities as described below:

- Let's Talk Project Engagement Page was live on 3 July 2025. Information on the Draft Hill 60 Crown Reserve Plan of Management was available through to 1 September 2025. There were 867 visitors to the project page and 388 documents were downloaded by visitors.
- On site Let's Talk Pop Up Event on 17 July 2025 11:30 am 1:30 pm. 34 people attended.
- Email and Letter Notices (with a combined total of 2,100) were sent to stakeholders including -
  - Adjoining property owners, Neighbourhood Forums and Let's Talk Online Registered participants with interest in the southern suburbs.
  - Applicants of the South Coast Native Title Claimants via NTSCORP.
  - Registered Aboriginal Parties to the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan AHIP.
  - NSW Aboriginal Land Council and Illawarra Local Aboriginal Land Council.
  - Chief Executive of Office of Environment and Heritage Local Government Act 1993 36D(3)(d)(i).
  - Current license holders within the PoM area (NSW Marine Rescue Port Kembla and Illawarra Triathlon Club Inc).
- Notice published in the Illawarra Mercury Council Update.

#### **RISK MANAGEMENT**

The CLM Act requires Council to prepare a new PoM for Council managed Crown Reserves. The PoM will guide future uses of the Hill 60 headland and enable Council to issue tenures in accordance with the PoM for periods greater than 12 months subject to separate processes of Council.

#### FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

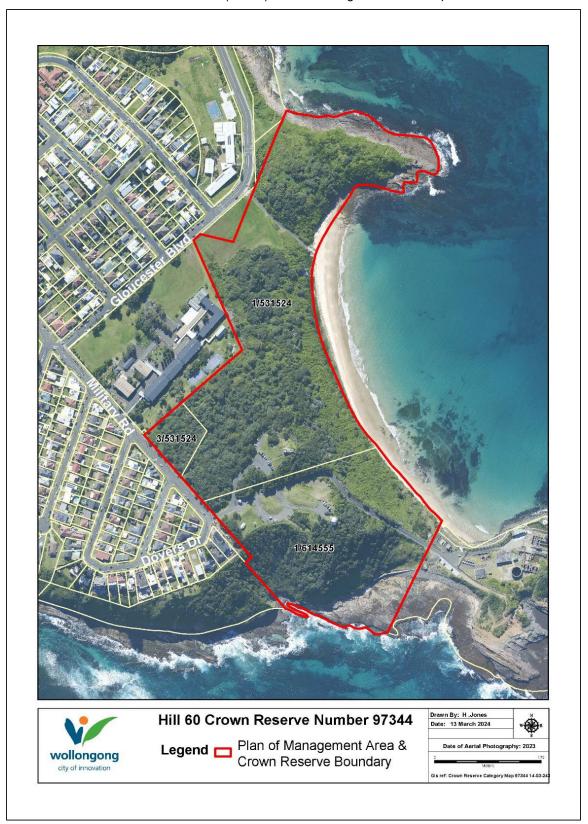
The PoM permits certain uses, activities and developments subject to meeting relevant legislative requirements and Council policies but does not in itself create new commitment or financial obligations on Council. The cost of developing the draft PoM was part of existing operational budgets within Council.

#### CONCLUSION

The draft Hill 60 Crown Reserve Plan of Management has been exhibited for public comment. Minor changes are proposed to the draft PoM that do not require further public exhibition. The Plan of Management acknowledges Council's careful measured commitment to safeguarding this significant headland while continuing to progress the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan cooperatively with the community into the future.

We pay our respects to Elders past, present and those emerging and extend our acknowledgement and respect to all Aboriginal people who call this city home. We recognise Aboriginal people as the first people to live in the area. We respect their living culture and recognise the positive contribution their voices, traditions and histories make to this city.

Under this Plan of Management ('PoM') for Hill 60 Crown Reserve Number 97344, the community land category of 'Area of Cultural Significance' has been applied to most of the reserve as a result of consultation with Aboriginal people traditionally associated with the land in accordance with the requirements of the *Local Government (General) Regulation 2021*<sup>1</sup>. The comment below was provided during the consultation process. It describes connection to the land.

"The landscape of Hill 60 is an historic landscape with sacred sites. The connection our people have with this land gives our people their identity and sense of belonging. Country was, and still is to many, a place of learning."

# **Key information**

This Plan of Management (PoM) has been prepared by Wollongong City Council (Council) and provides direction as to the use and management of Crown Reserve No. 97344, known as 'Hill 60'.

On 29 October 2018, Hill 60 was classified as 'community land' by Council resolution and later confirmed by the current Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure – Crown Lands (formally known as Department of Planning and Environment - Crown Lands)<sup>2</sup>. The preparation of a PoM is required both under the *Crown Land Management Act 2016*<sup>3</sup> (CLM Act) and the *Local Government Act 1993*<sup>4</sup> (LG Act).

This PoM specifically addresses the ongoing management of Hill 60. It outlines the way the reserve will be used and provides the framework for Council to follow in relation to the authorisation of leases and licences over the reserve in accordance with the provisions of the CLM Act. This PoM also includes a separate appendix (Appendix Document) which contains – among other things – a review of relevant legislation and Council policies which will also affect how the Hill 60 Reserve may be used.

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#### Introduction

This Plan of Management (PoM) applies to Crown Reserve No. 97344, known as 'Hill 60'. Hill 60' is located at the end of Military Road in Port Kembla. Vehicular access is via Military Road or Gloucester Boulevard. Hill 60 can also be accessed on foot via the Ngaraba-aan Cultural Trail.

The physical environment of the Reserve includes coastal rock platforms, sandy beach, steep rocky headlands and heavily vegetated areas at higher elevations. Hill 60 is dominated by the rocky headland of Boiler Point which rises steeply above Fisherman's Beach to a peak of 71 metres above sea level. Figure 1 outlines the extent of the area covered by this PoM, with information regarding existing uses and developments in the PoM area shown in Figure 2.

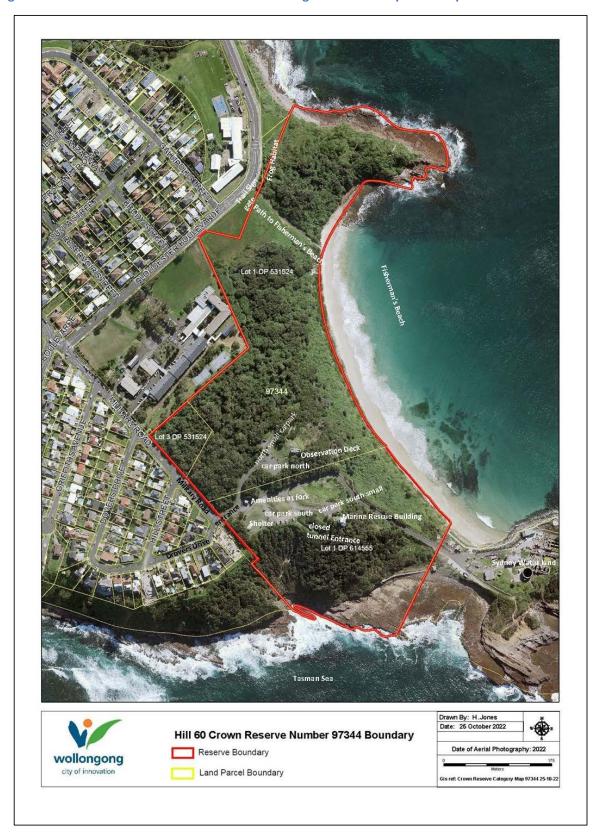


Figure 3 Consultation Plan - July 2023 - Engagement informs 2024 Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan Project

In 2015, Council endorsed the 'Hill 60 Conceptual Landscape Master Plan'. The Landscape Master Plan applies to Hill 60 (the PoM area) and to MM Beach (outside the area covered by this PoM). Under this PoM, Council will continue to manage the headland in accordance with the Landscape Master Plan. The Landscape Master Plan seeks to increase community understanding of the area's significance and to enhance the area when opportunity, legislative approval and community feedback are aligned. At the time of preparing this PoM, a project to establish an Accessible Viewing Area on Hill 60 had commenced. The project – a key part of the Landscape Master Plan – was informed by consideration of community feedback on the Consultation Plan that was exhibited for public comment in July 2023 (Figure 3).

The PoM is comprised of this document and the Appendix Document. The Appendix Document provides further details in relation to applicable legislation and contains photographs documenting the current condition of the reserve and any existing improvements.

# Purpose of the Hill 60 Crown Reserve Number 97344 Plan of Management

The purpose of this Plan of Management (PoM) is to comply with the *Crown Land Management Act 2016* (CLM Act) as Council manages the Hill 60 headland on a day-to-day basis and into the future. Hill 60 Crown Reserve Number 97344 is a Crown reserve where Wollongong City Council has been "appointed" the "Council Crown Land Manager" under the CLM Act.

A PoM is required for Crown reserves that are "appointed" to Council and are classified as "community land" Crown land. Council classified Crown reserve 97344 as "community land" in accordance with its resolution of 29 October 2018 and correspondence from the Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure – Crown Lands (DPHI – Crown Lands) dated 14 March 2019.

# Preparing a Plan of Management under the CLM Act

As "community land", the CLM Act requires Council to prepare a PoM for Hill 60 Crown reserve number 97344. The previous Crown Lands Act 1989 did not require a PoM.

This PoM has been prepared so that Council may:

- comply with the CLM Act by ensuring uses, developments and tenures permitted under this PoM accord with a Crown reserve purpose and core management objective of the relevant community land category as defined by the *Local Government Act 1993*
- continue to manage this Crown reserve as it has been doing (under the 1989 Act and now under the CLM Act 2016) by
  - o implementing the 2015 Council adopted Hill 60 Landscape Masterplan
  - o continuing existing uses of the land (and the related tenure agreements).

Under this PoM, implementing the Landscape Hill 60 Master Plan and continuing existing uses of the land is permitted, subject to legislative compliance and alignment with Council's 10-year Community Strategic Plan *Our Wollongong Our Future 2035* (Link to 2035 Plan). The PoM Information Schedule identifies possible permissible uses and developments. This PoM is an enabling document, and all permissible uses and developments are subject to separate processes of Council in the future. Inclusion as permissible under this PoM provides Council an opportunity to consider an activity, use or development. It is not a right for the activity, use or development to happen.

#### **Legislative Compliance**

Legislative compliance is an ongoing complex matter dependent on the location and type of activity or development or proposed tenure. More legislation applies to land under this PoM than just the CLM Act (See separate PoM Appendix document), such as, but not limited to:

- Native Title Act 1993 (Cth) Under this Act, there is a South Coast People: Tribunal No. NC2017/003
  Federal Court No. NSD 1331/2017 claim that affects this land.
- Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 (NSW) Under this Act, there is an NSW Aboriginal Land Council Claim (Number 42492 lodged on 19 December 2016) that affects this land.
- Local Government Act 1993 (NSW) This Act applies to this land as permitted by the CLM Act.
- National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974 (NSW) There is an existing Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) issued under this Act that affects land under this PoM.



- Heritage Act 1977 (NSW) State Heritage Register Listing Number 01492 Hill 60, Illowra Battery
  affects this land and a Local Heritage Item Number 61043 Hill 60, Fisherman's Beach, Boilers
  Point, and MM Beach affect this land. This Act sets parameters for heritage management.
- Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (NSW) The Wollongong 2009 Local Environmental Plan 2009 (LEP) and numerous State Environmental Planning Policies (all made under this Act) affect this land.

The separate Appendix document to this PoM provides information on the CLM Act and several separate pieces of legislation that may affect or regulate any possible use, development, management strategy or tenure that is permissible under this PoM.

For any possible permissible use, development, management strategy or tenure under this PoM, it is only permissible to the extent that legislative compliance can be obtained by following Council policies and standard operating procedures. Council's policies, strategies and supporting documents that may affect land under this PoM are also in the separate Appendix document.

#### Our Wollongong Our Future 2035 – Community Strategic Plan

Our Wollongong Our Future 2035 represents the highest level of strategic planning undertaken by Council. Council has many other strategies and plans for specific focuses that are developed following planning and engagement. Council refers to its adopted strategies and plans as Supporting Documents. These direction setting documents support the development of the Community Strategic Plan, Council's Resourcing Strategy, Delivery Program and Operational Plans. These documents include goals, strategies and actions specific to a project or location. However, until the actions are enabled through resourcing and included in the Delivery Program and Operational Plan, they remain aspirational. The Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan is a Council Supporting Document. The Master plan has been partially resourced to date, by inclusion in Council's Delivery Programs and Operational Plans and by successful grant applications for outside funding.

#### The Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan

Council has been managing the Crown reserve Number 97344 in line with the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan since 2015. The Landscape Master Plan was endorsed following consideration of comments from the public. Implementing the Master Plan has been in Council's Delivery Programs and Annual Operational Plans in different project stages since 2015. It is a long-term plan applying to a much larger land area than this PoM. The Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan considers land along MM beach to the headland and along the coastal edge near (but not including) the Port Kembla Pool. The Master Plan area is the same area that is shown in red outline as the study area of the Hill 60 Reserve Conservation Management Plan (CMP) in Figure 5. The separate Appendix document has more information on the CMP.

The CMP provides polices and management strategies to safeguard the heritage values of the large Master Plan area and is an in-depth exploration of available historic records and discussions with people connected to the area. The CMP is a document over 600 pages long. The CMP forms part of both the Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) and an approval under the *Heritage Act 1977* to implement the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan. Council obtained the AHIP and Heritage Act approvals in 2021.

The Landscape Master Plan does not propose dramatic changes within the headland. Within the PoM area (Figure 1), the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan seeks:



- To continue working with the Aboriginal community to further implement the Ngaraba-aan Cultural trail and to consider ways to better understand the Aboriginal cultural connection to the land and the context of the WWII era military use of the land on that connection.
- To provide for amenity improvements to facilitate the public's use of the area as a culturally significant coastal headland with a Public Recreation purpose. The Minister gazetted the Public Recreation purpose on 6 July 1984.

#### Rate of Implementation of Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan

It is unknown at the time of preparing this PoM, how much of the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan will be delivered over the next ten years within Crown reserve number 97344. Council cannot fund the works alone and will continue seeking grant funds for Master Plan projects. Hill 60 is one of 493 parks managed by Council and the needs of parks are to be balanced with needs of the community for footpaths and cycleways, local roads, car parks, public swimming pools, stormwater pipes and drains, Libraries and other community buildings and sports fields.

Each year Council considers updates to it 4-year Delivery Program and 1-year Operational Plan to determine how to best work towards the goals of *Our Wollongong Our Future 2032* within available resources and the cooperative networks with communities and other levels of government. The Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan is an ambitious plan to facilitate use of the area by the public while understanding and accepting that there are special limitations on the development of the land (the AHIP is an example). These limitations ensure that the cultural significance of the land will remain in place for us today and for future generations.

The Appendix document has more information on the 2015 conceptual Landscape Master Plan. For example, the Appendix includes the Conversation Snapshot for the Master Plan capital works project "Accessibility and Viewing Area Upgrade" that demonstrates how Council considered the feedback from the project's Consultation Plan (Figure 3) before starting construction works in 2024. These 2024 works are a result of detailed technical investigations, additional community feedback and compliance with the 2021 AHIP and *Heritage Act 1977* approvals. A general description of the works follows below for reference.

#### General description of the 2024 "Accessible Viewing Area" Project

When the 2024 works are completed, the following improvements are expected to have been made in accordance with the AHIP, *Heritage Act 1977* approvals and *State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport and Infrastructure) 2021*. Figure 4 shows site visit photographs of works in progress on 8 March 2024. These works are north and southwest of the Marine Rescue Building where there is existing carparking and park lawn areas, it includes the "car park south small" area shown in the PoM Figure 2 "Existing Uses & Developments".

- New position of entry gate to close car parking sunrise to sunset
- Weed removal and replace with native planting
- Feature paving on alignment of underground tunnel
- New Entry to Marine Rescue Building and car park
- New Accessible Parking
- New Accessible viewing area with Balustrade



## General Description of Possible Future Works (not exhaustive) subject to future processes

Every project to implement the conceptual 2015 Hill 60 Masterplan now and into the future will be the result of further detailed technical investigations, additional community feedback and compliance with 2021 AHIP and *Heritage Act 1977* approvals or any other future applicable approval that is required to undertake future projects that are resourced. For example, the Hill 60 Master Plan Accessible Viewing Platform project was included in Council's Delivery Program through to the 2024/25 financial year.

This area is important to the entire community, has complex heritage values and requires consistent and careful project planning and delivery leading to ongoing maintenance and renewal. As evidenced by the process to date, those matters take time, commitment and resources to get right.

Subject to getting it right in terms of process, resourcing and compliance with legislation as noted previously, the following possible "Future Works for Construction" were identified in the July 2023 Community Consultation Plan (Figure 3) used for the Accessible Viewing Platform Project completed in December 2024. The list below is organised by location descriptions:

## Park area beyond South Fork at Existing Amenities Block

- Raised threshold at entry for traffic calming to give pedestrians priority and reduce speeding on the existing access road in an area that is just beyond the existing amenities block
- New additional amenities block in an area of lawn that is between the existing large picnic shelter and the existing access road
- The existing lawn area near the large, covered picnic shelter will be upgraded to still include a lawn area but will also include pavement to create gathering spaces as well as an accessible connection between the carpark and the new additional amenities block
- Bus bays to be located along the existing access road near the existing public toilets and near the proposed new additional toilets
- Stair access to Military tunnels is proposed should the public tunnels be made safe for public use in the future
- More car parking in location of existing earth mounding

## Adaptive Re use of the Unsafe Military Tunnels under the Master Plan

The Master Plan calls for investigation of appropriate uses of the currently unsafe military tunnels. Council is investigating options for the future management of the tunnels and has commissioned a report by specialist architects. Opening the tunnels for periodic use such as public heritage tours or allowing periodic use of the tunnels for suitable filming projects could be an outcome that would be in keeping with the special limitations on the land.

Using the tunnels for a more intensive, regular use (for example recreational or tourist related use) would need to be sympathetic to the area's protected status under the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974* and the *Heritage Act 1977* and the Crown reserve's Public Recreation purpose.

The PoM Information Schedule at Row 2.2.i permits restoring the tunnels to a standard fit for periodic controlled public visitation or for a more intensive use to the extent that legislative compliance is possible. Until further investigations and other processes of Council are undertaken that result in a detailed adaptive reuse proposal to assess for legislative compliance, it is not possible to determine what adaptive reuse may occur on site in specific terms. It would also be contingent on Council's ability to secure resources to progress and assess potential adaptive re uses. Currently the tunnels will remain closed and graffiti on the outside of the tunnels will be removed periodically.

# Possible known new uses or tenures as result of Implementing the Master Plan (not exhaustive)

The Landscape Master Plan makes provision for a food/coffee van in an upgraded parking area. A food/coffee van would be a new use/development and require a tenure agreement in the form of a licence agreement. Given the area's cultural significance, it would be open to Council to consider in line with relevant legislation and Council's procurement policies, a future EOI process targeted to local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community run businesses.

The Landscape Master Plan also identifies that hang gliding and paragliding occur within the PoM area. The Conversation Snapshot for the Hill 60 Accessibility and Viewing Area Upgrade (Appendix) says Council "will fill in the uneven ground on the grassed area near the take-off area to improve access and safety." This take off area is north of the Observation Deck within the PoM area.

The hang gliding /paragliding activity is not otherwise currently regulated by Council by way of development consent in accordance with the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979* or by way



of tenure agreement for this use, therefore it would be a new use/development and require a tenure agreement in the form of a licence agreement.

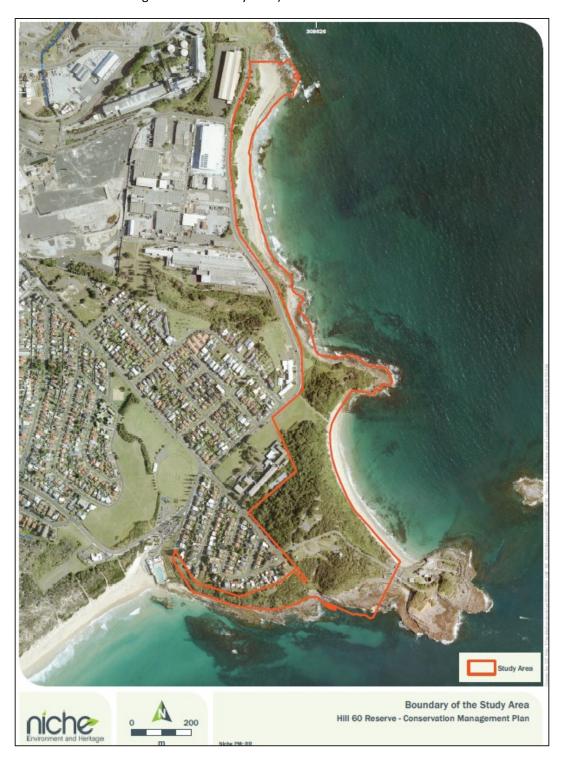
Requiring Development Consent (if obtained) and a licence agreement (if issued) would be consistent with Council's management approach for gliding activities at Bald Hill Lookout. Gliding is an inherent risky recreational activity that creates individual participant responsibility for ensuring personal safety and the safety of others. This use cannot override any other scheduled public use of the area (an event that is booked via Council for the area near the Observation Deck for example) and cannot be undertaken in conditions that are not suitable for the activity (unsafe winds, beach area already occupied by people to scale that does not permit a safe landing area for example). Landing on the beach below would be subject to a separate licence with DPHI – Crown Lands as Crown Reserve 97344 (the PoM area) does not extend to the landing area on Fisherman's Beach.

## Aims of the Hill 60 Crown Reserve PoM

This PoM for Crown Reserve Number 97344 Hill 60 has the following five (5) aims:

- 1. To demonstrate legislative compliance with the PoM making provisions of the CLM Act 2016
  - The PoM Information Schedule provided later in this document contains all the information that is required for a site-specific PoM under the CLM Act 2016.
- 2. To set the framework for management and use of the reserve (by Council and by others) to be compliant with any applicable legislation that may apply to any PoM permitted future uses, developments and activities including issuing tenure agreements.
- 3. To continue to implement the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan into the future so that more people know that this recreational land:
  - o has cultural significance for Aboriginal people for its past, present and future.
  - o has an extensive network of built forms from the WWII era.
  - Supports terrestrial and marine intertidal biodiversity values including native vegetation, beach and rocky shores
  - Provides potential habitat for a range of native terrestrial and marine flora and fauna species, including threatened species
- 4. To make the public aware that the area presents real hazards that are to be managed by the individual visitors to the reserve by their own choices given:
  - o Hill 60 is a place where six (6) fatalities have occurred from rock fishing between 2021 and 2024
  - o Fisherman's Beach is not a patrolled beach
  - There is no development consent or licence agreement for use of the glider take-off point on the headland or for the landing area at Fisherman's Beach. This is contrary to the way this use is regulated by Council at Bald Hill Lookout and Bell's Point in Austinmer. Regulation of this high-risk activity would not eliminate risk but would:
    - clarify if the activity should remain on site, and
    - bring the use in line with requirements under the LG Act and CLM Act, and
    - more equitably apply Council's policies on use of community land by sporting groups to the activities of the gliders at this location.
  - Council has fenced off the entrance to the military tunnels because it is not safe for the public to
    use the tunnels in their current state. Entering the tunnels is trespassing and a high-risk activity in
    regard to personal safety.
- 5. To make people aware the area has environmental values that support frog habitat, native vegetation and biodiversity. Council supports these values by the current practices of
  - o weed management by aerial and other methods
  - o involving the Aboriginal community in developing and implementing Vegetation Management Plans for areas that are of great significance to their community.
  - Careful and deliberate application of Asset Protection Zones for existing Council assets on the land that seek to address bushfire mitigation in a way that minimises impact on biodiversity and Aboriginal cultural values.



# Assessing progress and formal review of the PoM

The PoM purpose, aims, information schedule and the separate Appendix document constitute Council's management approach to this Crown reserve now and into the future. This PoM will be formally reviewed in five years to determine if changes are required to address legislative changes or new community needs. All the land under the PoM is affected by at least one of the two Heritage Item Curtilage areas (Figure 6) so management of heritage and cultural values is important and will be assessed in the future review.

Figure 6 below compares the Curtilage Areas of the two Heritage Items (State -01492 and Local-61043). The separate Appendix document provides these maps at a larger scale along with information on the *Heritage Act 1977* and the *Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979*. MM Beach, Boilers Point, Fisherman's Beach, Hill 60, Illowra Battery, Red Point are all protected Heritage Item land areas. These areas are all included in the Conservation Management Plan (CMP). The Appendix includes information extracts about these Heritage Items from the CMP.

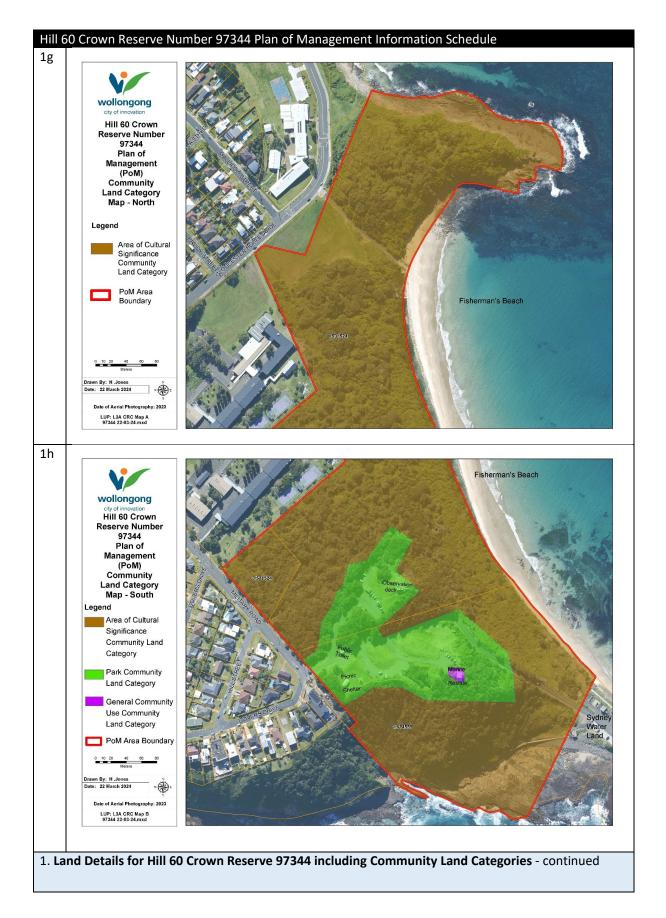

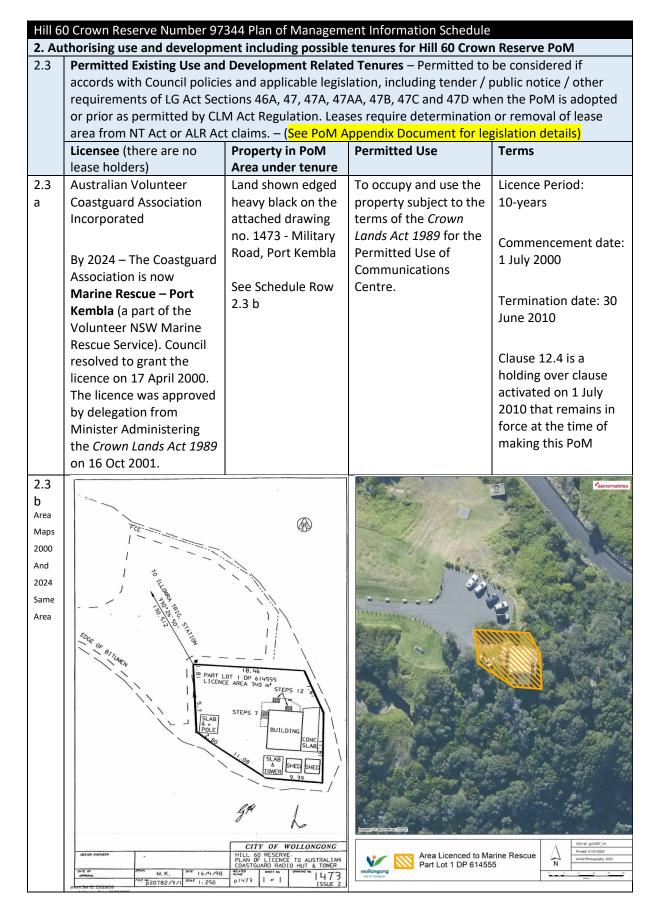

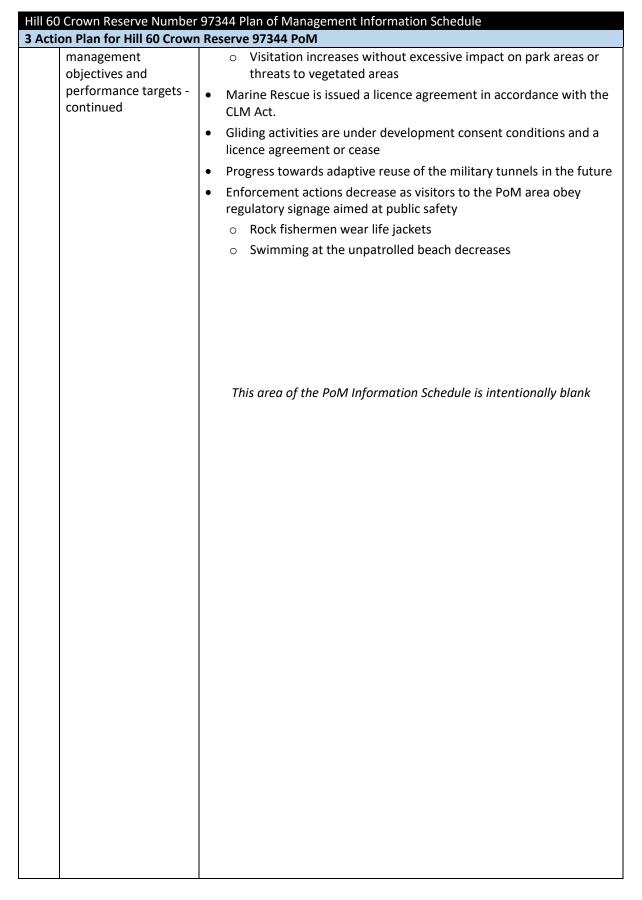

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# Introduction to Appendix Document – Part of Draft PoM for Hill 60

This **Appendix Document forms part of the Plan of Management (PoM)** that applies to the Crown reserve number 97344 located at Hill 60 in Port Kembla.

As described in the separate PoM document, the land under the PoM can be accessed via Military Road and Gloucester Boulevard by vehicle and by the Ngaraba-aan Cultural Trail on foot. The Ngaraba-aan Cultural trail begins north of the PoM area at Port Kembla Heritage Park / MM Beach, goes through the PoM area and then leads to Coomaditchie Lagoon. The Ngaraba-aan speaks to the continuous Aboriginal connection to this land, dispossession, military strongholds on the headland because of World War II and the growth of surrounding Port Kembla in the post war years fuelled by migration. The PoM area is the green portion of headland of Hill 60, shown in red outline in Figure 1.

Please also consider the PoM document under separate cover as well as this Appendix Document that supports the PoM by providing detailed site photographs, aerial mapping over time and other background information to enable a better understanding of the plan of management. Figures 1-2 in this Appendix Document are the same as figures 1-2 in the PoM document.

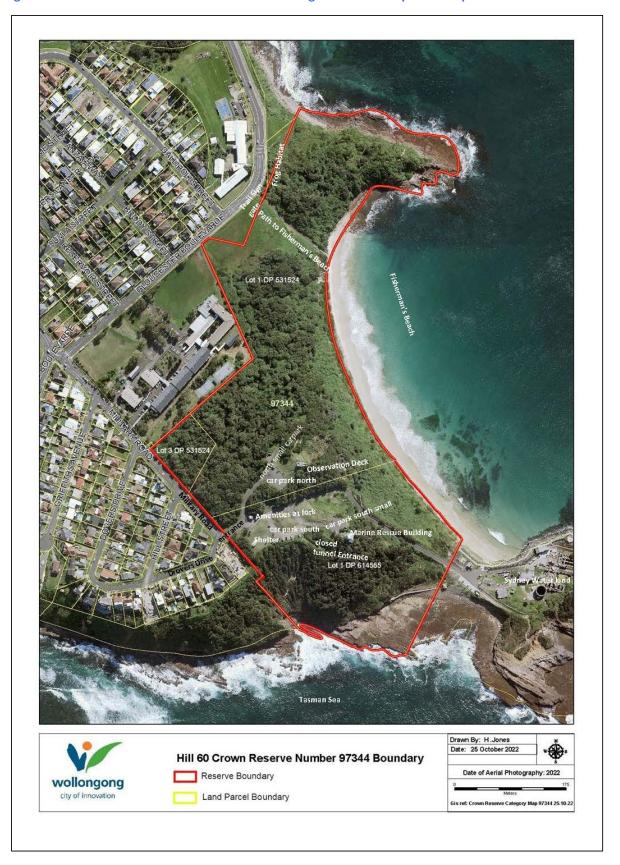
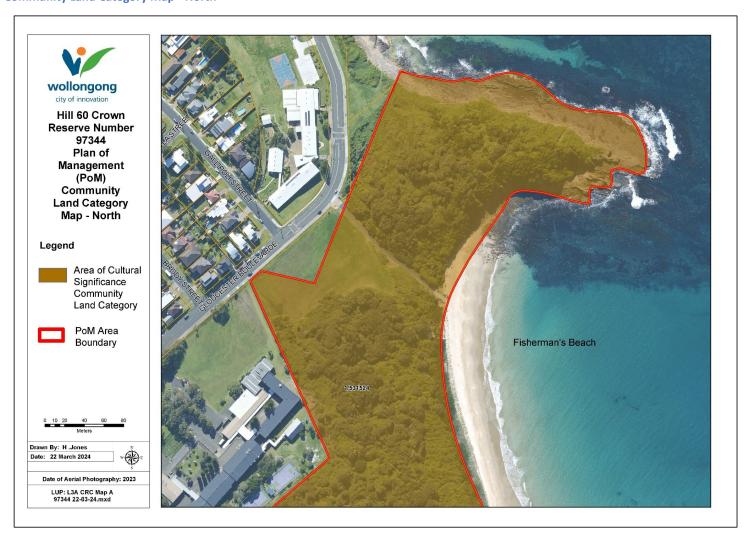


Figure 3 Community Land Category Map - North

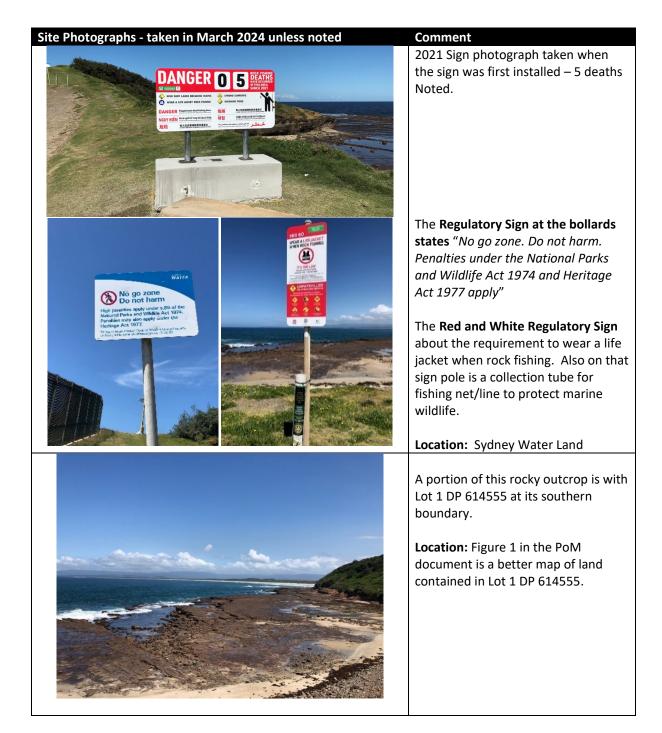

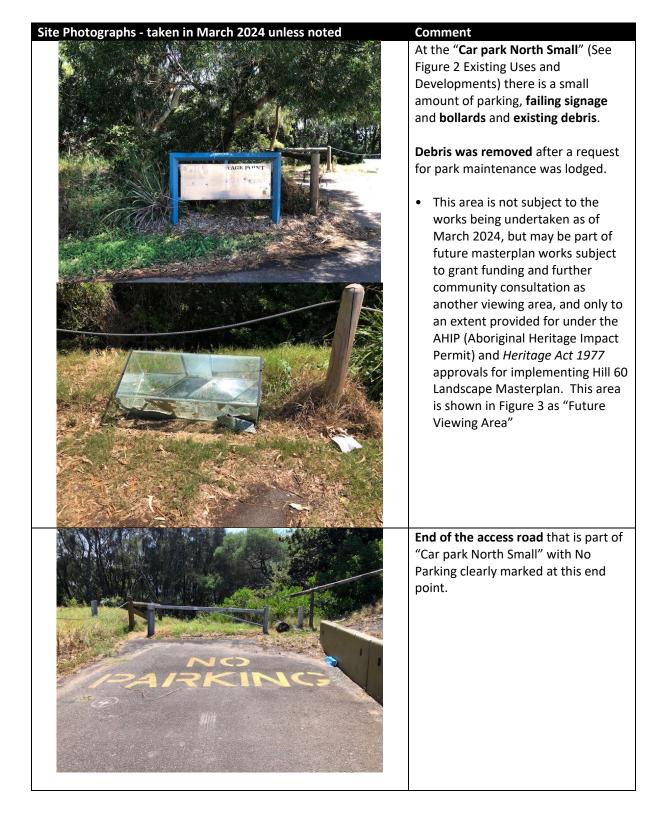

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# Hill 60 PoM Appendix - Legislative Framework

The primary legislation that impacts on how community land is managed or used is briefly described below. You can find further information regarding these acts at <a href="https://www.legislation.nsw.gov.au">www.legislation.nsw.gov.au</a>.

#### **Local Government Act 1993**

Section 35 of the Local Government Act 1993 (LG Act) provides that community land can only be used in accordance with:

- the plan of management applying to that area of community land, and
- any law permitting the use of the land for a specified purpose or otherwise regulating the use of the land, and
- the provisions of Division 2 of Chapter 6 of the Act.

Section 36 of the Act provides that a plan of management for community land must identify the following:

- a) the category of the land,
- b) the objectives and performance targets of the plan with respect to the land,
- c) the means by which the council proposes to achieve the plan's objectives and performance targets,
- d) the manner in which the council proposes to assess its performance with respect to the plan's objectives and performance targets,

and may require the prior approval of the council to the carrying out of any specified activity on the land.

A plan of management that applies to just one area of community land:

- a) must include a description of:
  - (i) the condition of the land, and of any buildings or other improvements on the land, as at the date of adoption of the plan of management, and
  - (ii) the use of the land and any such buildings or improvements as at that date, and
- b) must:
  - (i) specify the purposes for which the land, and any such buildings or improvements, will be permitted to be used, and
  - (ii) specify the purposes for which any further development of the land will be permitted, whether under lease or licence or otherwise, and
  - (iii) describe the scale and intensity of any such permitted use or development.

Land is to be categorised as one or more of the following:

- a) a natural area
- b) a sportsground



- c) a park
- d) an area of cultural significance
- e) general community use

Land that is categorised as a natural area is to be further categorised as one or more of the following:

- a) bushland
- b) wetland
- c) escarpment
- d) watercourse
- e) foreshore
- f) a category prescribed by the regulations.

Additionally, under section 36 of the LG Act, a site-specific PoM must be made for land declared:

- as critical habitat, or directly affected by a threat abatement plan or a recovery plan under threatened species laws (sections 36A(2) and 36B(3))
- by council to contain significant natural features (section 36C(2))
- by council to be of cultural significance (section 36D(2)).

#### Community Land Category Core Management Objectives that apply to land under this PoM

As noted in the separate primary PoM document and shown in this Appendix document as Figures 3 and 4, the community land categories of Area of Cultural Significance, Park and General Community Use apply to land under the PoM.

For an area of cultural significance, the core management objectives as per the *Local Government Act 1993* are set out in section 36H of the LG Act.

#### 36H Core objectives for management of community land categorised as an area of cultural significance

- (1) The core objectives for management of community land categorised as an area of cultural significance are to retain and enhance the cultural significance of the area (namely its Aboriginal, aesthetic, archaeological, historical, technical or research or social significance) for past, present or future generations by the active use of conservation methods.
- (2) Those conservation methods may include any or all of the following methods—
  - (a) the continuous protective care and maintenance of the physical material of the land or of the context and setting of the area of cultural significance,
  - (b) the restoration of the land, that is, the returning of the existing physical material of the land to a known earlier state by removing accretions or by reassembling existing components without the introduction of new material,



- (c) the reconstruction of the land, that is, the returning of the land as nearly as possible to a known earlier state,
- (d) the adaptive reuse of the land, that is, the enhancement or reinforcement of the cultural significance of the land by the introduction of sympathetic alterations or additions to allow compatible uses (that is, uses that involve no changes to the cultural significance of the physical material of the area, or uses that involve changes that are substantially reversible or changes that require a minimum impact),
- (e) the preservation of the land, that is, the maintenance of the physical material of the land in its existing state and the retardation of deterioration of the land.
- (3) A reference in subsection (2) to land includes a reference to any buildings erected on the land.

#### 36G Core objectives for management of community land categorised as a park

The core objectives for management of community land categorised as a park are—

- (a) to encourage, promote and facilitate recreational, cultural, social and educational pastimes and activities, and
- (b) to provide for passive recreational activities or pastimes and for the casual playing of games, and
- (c) to improve the land in such a way as to promote and facilitate its use to achieve the other core objectives for its management.

#### 361 Core objectives for management of community land categorised as general community use

The core objectives for management of community land categorised as general community use are to promote, encourage and provide for the use of the land, and to provide facilities on the land, to meet the current and future needs of the local community and of the wider public—

- (a) in relation to public recreation and the physical, cultural, social and intellectual welfare or development of individual members of the public, and
- (b) in relation to purposes for which a lease, licence or other estate may be granted in respect of the land (other than the provision of public utilities and works associated with or ancillary to public utilities).

The LG Act also has requirements that will apply to Crown Land under a CLM Act PoM. These are sections 46A, 47, 47A, 47AA, 47B, 47C and 47D of the Local Government Act.

#### 46A Means of granting leases, licences and other estates

- (1) A plan of management is to specify, in relation to the community land to which it applies, any purposes for which a lease, licence or other estate may be granted only by tender in accordance with Division 1 of Part 3.
- (2) Nothing in this section precludes a council from applying a tender process in respect of the grant of any particular lease, licence or estate.
- (3) A lease or licence for a term exceeding 5 years may be granted only by tender in accordance with Division 1 of Part 3, unless it is granted to a non-profit organisation.



#### 47 Leases, licences and other estates in respect of community land—terms greater than 5 years

- (1) If a council proposes to grant a lease, licence or other estate in respect of community land for a period (including any period for which the lease, licence or other estate could be renewed by the exercise of an option) exceeding 5-years, it must—
  - (a) give public notice of the proposal (including on the council's website), and
  - (b) exhibit notice of the proposal on the land to which the proposal relates, and
  - (c) give notice of the proposal to such persons as appear to it to own or occupy the land adjoining the community land, and
  - (d) give notice of the proposal to any other person, appearing to the council to be the owner or occupier of land in the vicinity of the community land, if in the opinion of the council the land the subject of the proposal is likely to form the primary focus of the person's enjoyment of community land.
- (2) A notice of the proposal must include—
  - information sufficient to identify the community land concerned
  - the purpose for which the land will be used under the proposed lease, licence or other estate
  - the term of the proposed lease, licence or other estate (including particulars of any options for renewal)
  - the name of the person to whom it is proposed to grant the lease, licence or other estate (if known)
  - a statement that submissions in writing may be made to the council concerning the proposal within a period, not less than 28 days, specified in the notice.
- (3) Any person may make a submission in writing to the council during the period specified for the purpose in the notice.
- (4) Before granting the lease, licence or other estate, the council must consider all submissions duly made to it.
- (5) The council must not grant the lease, licence or other estate except with the Minister's consent, if—
  - (a) a person makes a submission by way of objection to the proposal, or
  - (b) in the case of a lease or licence, the period (including any period for which the lease or licence could be renewed by the exercise of an option) of the lease or licence exceeds 21 years.
- (6) If the council applies for the Minister's consent, it must forward with its application—
  - a copy of the plan of management for the land
  - details of all objections received and a statement setting out, for each objection, the council's decision and the reasons for its decision
  - a statement setting out all the facts concerning the proposal to grant the lease, licence or other
  - a copy of the public notice of the proposal
  - a statement setting out the terms, conditions, restrictions and covenants proposed to be included in the lease, licence or other estate



- if the application relates to a lease or licence for a period (including any period for which the lease or licence could be renewed by the exercise of an option) exceeding 21 years, a statement outlining the special circumstances that justify the period of the lease or licence exceeding 21 years
- a statement setting out the manner in which and the extent to which the public interest would, in
  the council's opinion, be affected by the granting of the proposed lease, licence or other estate,
  including the manner in which and the extent to which the needs of the area with respect to
  community land would, in the council's opinion, be adversely affected by the granting of the
  proposed lease, licence or other estate.
- (7) On receipt of the application, the Minister must request the Director of Planning to furnish a report concerning the application within such period as the Minister specifies.
- (8) After considering the application and any report of the Director of Planning, the Minister, if satisfied that—
  - (a) subsections (1), (2) and (6) have been complied with, and
  - (b) such consent would not contravene section 46, and
  - (c) in all the circumstances, it is desirable to grant consent, may consent to the granting of a lease, licence or other estate in respect of the whole or part of the land to which the application relates, subject to such terms and conditions as the Minister specifies.
- (8AA) The Minister may consent to a lease or licence referred to in subsection (5)(b) only if the Minister is satisfied that there are special circumstances that justify the period of the lease or licence exceeding 21 years.
- (8A) On request by any person, the Minister must provide that person, within 14 days of that request, with a written statement of reasons for consenting to, or refusing to consent to, the granting of a lease, licence or other estate in accordance with subsection (8).
- (9) The Minister's consent is conclusive evidence that the council has complied with subsections (1), (2) and (6).
- (10) For the purposes of this section, any provision made by a lease or licence, or by an instrument granting any other estate, in respect of community land, according to which the council—
  - (a) would suffer a disadvantage or penalty if the same or a similar lease, licence or estate were not to be granted, for a further term, after the expiry of the current lease, licence or other estate, or
  - (b) would enjoy an advantage or benefit if the same or a similar lease, licence or estate were to be so granted, is taken to confer an option for renewal for a term equal to the further term.

#### 47A Leases, licences and other estates in respect of community land—terms of 5 years or less

(1) This section applies to a lease, licence or other estate in respect of community land granted for a period that (including any period for which the lease, licence or other estate could be renewed by the exercise of an option) does not exceed 5-years, other than a lease, licence or other estate exempted by the regulations.



- (2) If a council proposes to grant a lease, licence or other estate to which this section applies
  - (a) the proposal must be notified and exhibited in the manner prescribed by section 47, and
  - (b) the provisions of section 47(3) and (4) apply to the proposal, and
  - (c) on receipt by the council of a written request from the Minister, the proposal is to be referred to the Minister, who is to determine whether or not the provisions of section 47(5)–(9) are to apply to the proposal.
- (3) If the Minister, under subsection (2)(c), determines that the provisions of section 47(5)–(9) are to apply to the proposal—
  - (a) the council, the Minister and the Director of Planning are to deal with the proposal in accordance with the provisions of section 47(1)-(8), and
  - (b) section 47(9) has effect with respect to the Minister's consent.

#### 47AA Special provisions for leases, licences and other estates granted for filming projects

- (1) A council that proposes to grant a lease, licence or other estate in respect of community land under section 47A in order to allow a filming project to be carried out on community land—
  - (a) that is critical habitat (as defined in section 36A(1)), or
  - (b) that is directly affected by a recovery plan or threat abatement plan, as referred to in section 36B(2), or
  - (c) that is declared to be an area of cultural significance under section 36D(1) because of the presence on the land of any item that the council considers to be of Aboriginal significance, must, in addition to complying with section 47A, notify or advertise the proposal in the manner prescribed by the regulations for the purposes of this section.
- (2) Despite section 47A(2), a council that is of the opinion that a filming project proposed to be carried out under a lease, licence or other estate granted under section 47A will have a minor impact on the environment and on public amenity may state in the notice of the proposal required by section 47A(2) that submissions in writing may be made to the council concerning the proposal within a period, not less than 7-days, specified in the notice.
- (3) Regulations may be made for or with respect to guidelines that must be taken into consideration by councils in determining whether to grant a lease, licence or other estate in respect of community land in order to allow a filming project to be carried out on the land.

#### 47B Lease or licence in respect of natural area

The land under this PoM is not categorised as an area of natural area. Therefore, this section does not apply to land under the PoM.

#### 47C Sublease of community land

(1) In addition to any restrictions created by the lease, community land that is the subject of a lease cannot be sublet for a purpose other than—



- (a) the purpose for which, as notified under section 47(2), the land was to be used under the lease, or
- (b) a purpose prescribed by the regulations.
- (2) A lease is void to the extent that its provisions are inconsistent with this section.

#### 47D Occupation of community land otherwise than by lease or licence

- (1) The exclusive occupation or exclusive use by any person of community land otherwise than in accordance with—
  - (a) a lease, licence or estate to which section 47 or 47A applies, or
  - (b) a sublease or other title directly or indirectly derived from the holder of such a lease, licence or estate, is prohibited.
- (2) This section does not apply to—
  - (a) the occupation or use of part of the site of a senior citizens' centre or home or community care facility by a duly appointed manager of the centre, or
  - (b) the occupation or use of community land by persons, and in circumstances, prescribed by the regulations.

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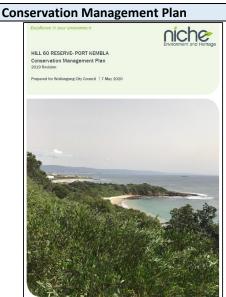

#### **Explanation of Plan**

This 7 May 2020 "Conservation Management Plan for Hill 60 Reserve" (CMP) forms part of the Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit (AHIP) to implement the Hill 60 Landscape Masterplan.

The CMP also provides forms part of any approvals obtained under the Heritage Act 1977. The Conservation Management Plan provides conservation management policies and strategies for both Aboriginal and Non-Aboriginal (Military era) heritage items — intangible (cultural) and tangible (built forms or other artefact types) and applies across the entire State Heritage Register Listing area (includes MM Beach and the headland) — being State Heritage Register Listing Number 01492 — Hill 60, Illowra Battery

The CMP identifies Aboriginal Cultural Material to a level to conserve and manage under the Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit to implement the Landscape Masterplan.

Specific details are not provided here as it is not for Council to share Aboriginal cultural information. Sharing cultural information is the realm of Aboriginal people traditionally associated with the area. Such information may be shared as an outcome of future Aboriginal Artwork and interpretive signage projects.

The CMP identifies 27 built heritage items across the PoM area that relate to the WWII era various conditions ranging from not safe structurally to excellent.

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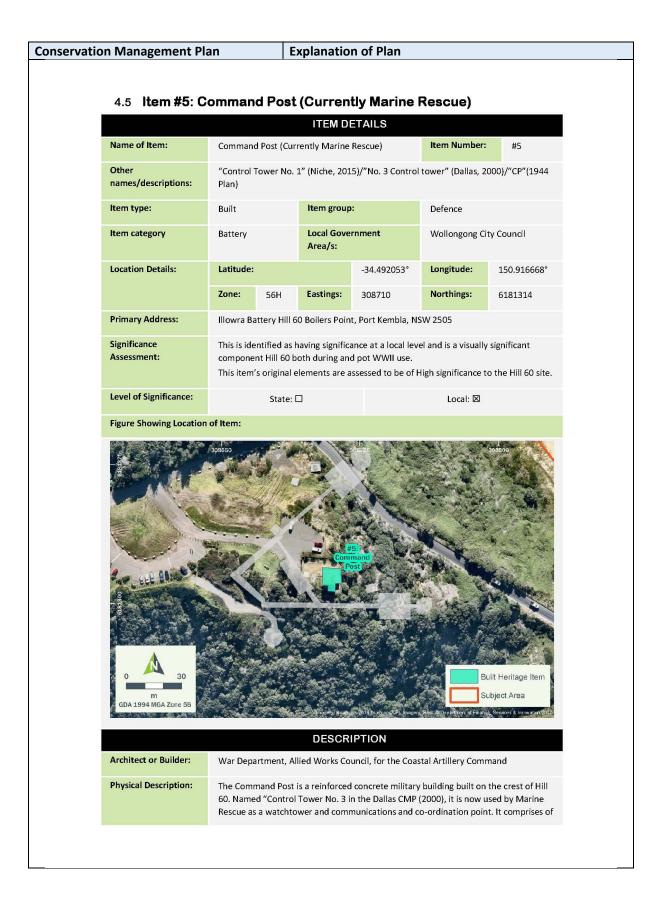

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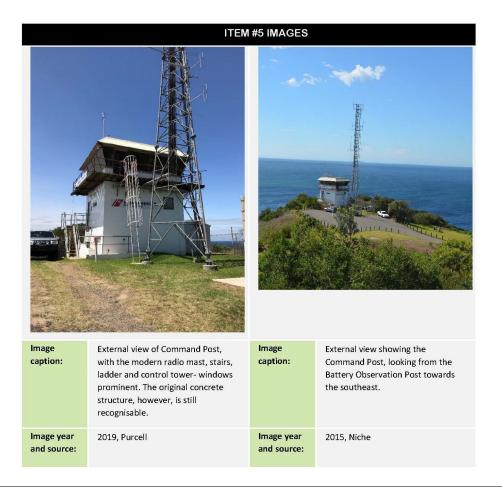

	HISTORY and THEMES
Historical Outline:	This structure, built in 1940, was originally constructed in conjunction with the Breakwater Battery as an Observation Post on Hill 60 (Battery Observation Post (Item #29) Listing Sheet). With the construction of the Illowra Battery in 1942, this location superseded the Breakwater Battery Observation Post as the Command Post of the Kembla Fortress (made up of the three batteries guarding Port Kembla). This structure had a very exposed location, and therefore was deemed as unsuitable as the overall command post for the Kembla fortress, and is marked on plans as 'temporary'. However, its proximity to the gun emplacements, the plotting room/military tunnels and the reduced threat of large-scale assault as World War Two progressed allowed for this item to be used as a significant structure for the battery (Hill 60 Listing sheet, 2010).  Inventory set aside for this item at time of construction was as follows:  1 Yale Lock 2 keys  1 Iron-clad switch  2 bulkhead lights complete  8 ironclad power points  2 desk 30 1/2 x 14" shelf under & 2 desk lights  2 desk chairs complete on platform  (as per Army Logistics Papers, ANA, 1942)  In the post war period the fittings were removed, and this structure was selected by marine rescue for use as their watchtower.

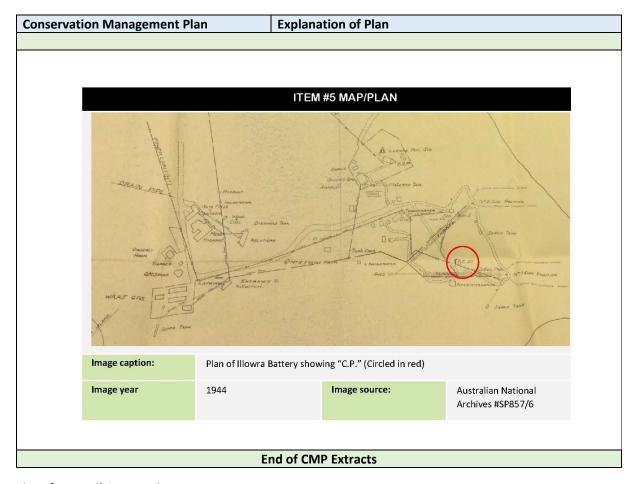

#### **Crown Land Management Act 2016**

Crown reserves are land set aside on behalf of the community for a wide range of public purposes, including environmental and heritage protection, recreation and sport, open space, community halls, special events and government services.

Crown land is governed by the CLM Act, which provides a framework for the state government, local councils and members of the community to work together to provide care, control and management of Crown reserves.

Under the CLM Act, as Council Crown land managers, councils manage Crown land as if it were public land under the LG Act. However, it must still be managed in accordance with the purpose of the land and cannot be used for an activity incompatible with its purpose – for example, Crown land assigned the purpose of 'environmental protection' cannot be used in a way that compromises its environmental integrity.

Councils must also manage Crown land in accordance with the objects and principles of Crown land management outlined in the CLM Act. The objects and principles are the key values that guide Crown land management to benefit the community and to ensure that Crown land is managed for sustainable, multiple uses.

#### **Principles of Crown land management**

- Environmental protection principles are to be observed in the management and administration of Crown land.
- The natural resources of Crown land (including water, soil, flora, fauna and scenic quality) will be conserved wherever possible.
- Public use and enjoyment of appropriate Crown land are to be encouraged.

Where appropriate, multiple uses of Crown land should be encouraged.

- Where appropriate, Crown land should be used and managed in such a way that both the land and its resources are sustained.
- Crown land is to be occupied, used, sold, leased, licensed or otherwise dealt with in the best interests of the state of NSW, consistent with the above principles.

#### Crown land management compliance

In addition to management and use of Crown reserves that is aligned with the reserve purpose(s), there are other influences over council management of Crown reserves. For example, Crown land managers may have conditions attached to any appointment instruments, or councils may have to comply with specific or general Crown land management rules that may be published in the NSW Government Gazette. Councils must also comply with any Crown land regulations that may be made. The Crown Land Management Regulation 2018 applies currently.

#### 2.14 Additional purposes for dedicated or reserved Crown land

(1) The Minister may, by notice published in the Gazette, authorise dedicated or reserved Crown land to be used for one or more additional purposes.



- (2) Before doing so, the Minister must be satisfied that the use of the dedicated or reserved Crown land for each additional purpose—
  - (a) would be in the public interest, and
  - (b) would not be likely to materially harm the use of the land for any of the purposes (an *existing purpose*) for which it is dedicated or reserved.
- (3) Without limitation, the following considerations are relevant to the question of whether the use of dedicated or reserved Crown land for an additional purpose would not be likely to materially harm its use for an existing purpose—
  - (a) the proportion of the area of the land that may be affected by the additional purpose,
  - (b) if the activities to be conducted for the additional purpose will be intermittent, the frequency and duration of the impacts of those activities,
  - (c) the degree of permanence of likely harm and in particular whether that harm is irreversible,
  - (d) the current condition of the land,
  - (e) the geographical, environmental and social context of the land,
  - (f) any other considerations that may be prescribed by the regulations.
- (4) An additional purpose does not limit any existing purpose.
- 2.14 Assessment of Request for Additional Reserve Purpose for NSW Volunteer Marine Rescue Services In relation to the existing use of a small portion of the land under the PoM under a licence for NSW Volunteer Marine Rescue Services Operations by Port Kembla Volunteer Marine Rescue Services is the following:
- (a) The existing licence area of 340 m<sup>2</sup> is less than 1% of the land area of the Crown reserve. The entire Crown reserve land area is 210,355 m<sup>2</sup> therefore the license applies to only 0.16 % of the reserve.
- (b) and (c) The activities conducted do require for the use and occupation of the licence area on a regular basis. There is a provision relating to termination subject to any successful claim determination under the NT Act.
- (d) the land is in a current condition for this use of the land to continue. It is improved by fencing, car paring and there is an existing building with adaptive re use improvements for the carrying out of Marine Rescue operations that have been in place since 1998 if not before.
- (e) The location on the headland provides appropriate views of the coastline as needed for coast watch / marine rescue patrol. This is a long standing use and meets **the public good of providing emergency**response services in accordance with the State Emergency and Rescue Management Act 1989 No 165 NSW Legislation
- (f) there are no other considerations prescribed by the regulations as of the making of this PoM

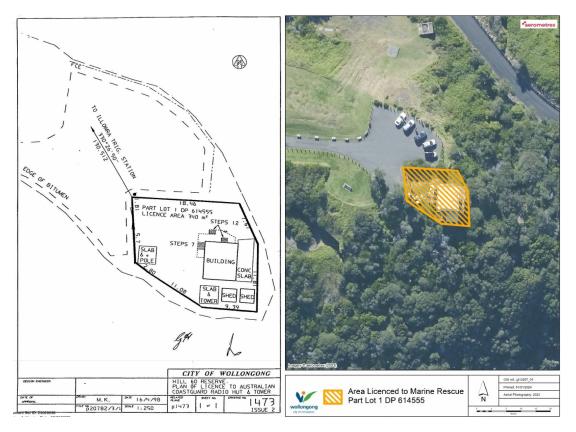


(4) as noted in response to (b) and (c) earlier, there is a termination provision in the existing licence that would be included in any future licence under this PoM so there is no lasting limitation on the use of the land for its public recreation purpose. In addition, the use of the area under licence is not proposed to be increased and only constitutes 0.16 % of the Crown Reserve land area as noted in (a) response.

#### Conclusion of 2.14 Assessment

The conclusion of assessment by Council is that there is unlikely to be material harm to the Reserve in relation to its use for its public recreation public purpose. The use is a public good and therefore it is requested that an additional reserve purpose be applied to the area that is subject to the existing licence area (that is the same as the area shown as a proposed licence area in 2024).

Further information is provided in Rows 2.3a and 2.3b of the POM Information Schedule that is included in the separate "Primary" PoM document.

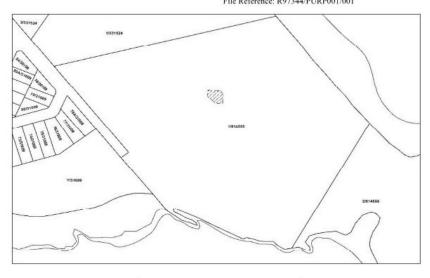

#### **Native Title Act 1993**

The Commonwealth *Native Title Act 1993* (NT Act) recognises and protects native title rights and interests. The objects of the NT Act are to:

- provide for the recognition and protection of native title
- establish ways in which future dealings affecting native title may proceed and to set standards for those dealings
- establish a mechanism for determining claims to native title
- provide for, or permit, the validation of past acts invalidated because of the existence of native title.

The NT Act may affect use of Crown land, particularly development and granting of tenure.

Specifically, the CLM Act makes it mandatory for council to engage or employ a native title manager. This role provides advice to council as to how the council's dealings and activities on Crown land can be valid or not valid in accordance with the NT Act.

Council must obtain the written advice from an accredited native title manager that Council complies with any applicable provisions of the native title legislation when:

- a) granting leases, licences, permits, forestry rights, easements or rights of way over the land
- b) mortgaging the land or allowing it to be mortgaged
- c) imposing, requiring or agreeing to covenants, conditions or other restrictions on use (or removing or releasing, or agreeing to remove or release, covenants, conditions or other restrictions on use) in connection with dealings involving the land
- d) approving (or submitting for approval) a plan of management for the land that authorises or permits any of the kinds of dealings referred to in (a), (b) or (c).

Native title rights are different to, and separate from, the statutory right of Aboriginal Land Councils to make claims for land under the *NSW Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983*. Where a land claim is granted under NSW legislation, the relevant Land Council is also still subject to the Federal Native Title legislation.

#### Council's Native Title Manager Advice for the PoM - A Summary

The PoM area is subject to an undetermined Registered Native Title claim under the Federal Native Title Act 1993 (NT Act) by the South Coast People, Native Title Tribunal: NC2017:003 Federal Court: NSD 1331/2017. Registered Native Title claimants have procedural rights under the NT Act.

In accordance with the CLM Act, Council's Native Title Manager has provided advice on the draft PoM. The advice identifies the applicable provisions of the NT Act that are to be complied with when preparing the draft PoM and identifies pathways to validate possible future acts that are permissible under this draft PoM, subject to Council providing any procedural rights to registered Native Title Claimants under the NT Act.

The advice indicates that adding an additional Crown reserve purpose for the existing 340 m<sup>2</sup> licenced area for the Emergency Services Operations of the Volunteer Marine Rescue Port Kembla (part of NSW Marine Rescue) could be a valid future act for the purposes of the NT Act because the licence would have no Page 54 Appendix Document – Part of the Hill 60 Crown Reserve Number 97344 Plan of Management



greater impact upon Native Title than granting a licence to a sporting club for sporting grounds and use of an existing building that is consistent with, or ancillary to, the reserve purpose of "public recreation" gazetted for Crown Reserve 97344 on 6 July 1984. Any procedural rights under the NT Act would need to be provided to the South Coast claimants by Council at each step.

Native Title advice will also to be sought when future licenses or development consents or review of environmental factors are prepared under the Infrastructure SEPP for activities to maintain or improve facilities within the PoM area. Compliance with the NT Act is an on-going obligation when managing Crown land.

"Future Acts" permitted under the PoM will be assessed in accordance with the NT Act before they are undertaken. A PoM permits a larger number of activities than will actually occur within the PoM area in a similar way that within the Land Use Zone RE1 permits a larger number of uses or developments under the Local Environmental Plan (LEP) as activities are dependent on other future actions such as obtaining development consent or securing funding in a future Council Annual plan (Council's budget) or obtaining a license over the land subject to Council's policies and compliance with provisions under both the Local Government Act 1993 and the CLM Act.

Again, each step towards undertaking a new activity, a new licence or development on Crown land will incur its own additional assessment in regard to compliance with the NT Act.

#### **NSW State legislation**

#### **Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983**

The Aboriginal Land Rights Act 1983 (ALR Act) is important legislation that recognises the rights of Aboriginal peoples in NSW. It recognises the need of Aboriginal peoples for land and acknowledges that land for Aboriginal people in the past was progressively reduced without compensation. Crown land meeting certain criteria may be granted to an Aboriginal Land Council. This Act may affect dealings with Crown land that is potentially claimable. There is an existing undetermined ALR Act claim affecting the PoM area (Number 42492 lodged on 19 December 2016 by NSW Aboriginal Land Council).

# **Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979**

The Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979 (EP&A Act) provides the framework for planning and development across NSW and guides environmental planning instruments which provide a basis for development control.

The EP&A Act ensures that effects on the natural environment, along with social and economic factors, are considered by the council when granting approval for or undertaking works, developments or activities.

This Act is also the enabling legislation for planning policies which may have a direct influence on open space management. On a state-wide level there are State Environmental Planning Policies (SEPPs). On a regional level there are Regional Environmental Plans (REPs). On a local level there are Local Environmental Plans (LEPs) as well as Development Control Plans (DCPs).



#### Wollongong LEP 2009 – Heritage Provision

Wollongong LEP 2009 – Part 5 Section 5.10 below applies to Heritage Listed Items. Therefore, it could be considered as a pathway for activities requiring development consent in the future if appropriate and in keeping with the PoM.

#### 5.10 Heritage conservation

**Note** — Heritage items (if any) are listed and described in Schedule 5. Heritage conservation areas (if any) are shown on the *Heritage Map* as well as being described in Schedule 5.

- (1) Objectives The objectives of this clause are as follows—
  - (a) to conserve the environmental heritage of Wollongong,
  - (b) to conserve the heritage significance of heritage items and heritage conservation areas, including associated fabric, settings and views,
  - (c) to conserve archaeological sites,
  - (d) to conserve Aboriginal objects and Aboriginal places of heritage significance.
- (2) Requirement for consent Development consent is required for any of the following—
  - (a) demolishing or moving any of the following or altering the exterior of any of the following (including, in the case of a building, making changes to its detail, fabric, finish or appearance)—
    - (i) a heritage item,
    - (ii) an Aboriginal object,
    - (iii) a building, work, relic or tree within a heritage conservation area,
  - (b) altering a heritage item that is a building by making structural changes to its interior or by making changes to anything inside the item that is specified in Schedule 5 in relation to the item,
  - (c) disturbing or excavating an archaeological site while knowing, or having reasonable cause to suspect, that the disturbance or excavation will or is likely to result in a relic being discovered, exposed, moved, damaged or destroyed,
  - (d) disturbing or excavating an Aboriginal place of heritage significance,
  - (e) erecting a building on land—
    - (i) on which a heritage item is located or that is within a heritage conservation area, or
    - (ii) on which an Aboriginal object is located or that is within an Aboriginal place of heritage significance,
  - (f) subdividing land—
    - (i) on which a heritage item is located or that is within a heritage conservation area, or



- (ii) on which an Aboriginal object is located or that is within an Aboriginal place of heritage significance.
- (3) When consent not required However, development consent under this clause is not required if—
  - (a) the applicant has notified the consent authority of the proposed development and the consent authority has advised the applicant in writing before any work is carried out that it is satisfied that the proposed development—
    - (i) is of a minor nature or is for the maintenance of the heritage item, Aboriginal object, Aboriginal place of heritage significance or archaeological site or a building, work, relic, tree or place within the heritage conservation area, and
    - (ii) would not adversely affect the heritage significance of the heritage item, Aboriginal object, Aboriginal place, archaeological site or heritage conservation area, or
  - (b) the development is in a cemetery or burial ground and the proposed development—
    - (i) is the creation of a new grave or monument, or excavation or disturbance of land for the purpose of conserving or repairing monuments or grave markers, and
    - (ii) would not cause disturbance to human remains, relics, Aboriginal objects in the form of grave goods, or to an Aboriginal place of heritage significance, or
  - (c) the development is limited to the removal of a tree or other vegetation that the Council is satisfied is a risk to human life or property, or
  - (d) the development is exempt development.
- (4) Effect of proposed development on heritage significance The consent authority must, before granting consent under this clause in respect of a heritage item or heritage conservation area, consider the effect of the proposed development on the heritage significance of the item or area concerned. This subclause applies regardless of whether a heritage management document is prepared under subclause (5) or a heritage conservation management plan is submitted under subclause (6).
- (5) Heritage assessment The consent authority may, before granting consent to any development—
  - (a) on land on which a heritage item is located, or
  - (b) on land that is within a heritage conservation area, or
  - (c) on land that is within the vicinity of land referred to in paragraph (a) or (b), require a heritage management document to be prepared that assesses the extent to which the carrying out of the proposed development would affect the heritage significance of the heritage item or heritage conservation area concerned.
- (6) **Heritage conservation management plans** The consent authority may require, after considering the heritage significance of a heritage item and the extent of change proposed to it, the submission of a heritage conservation management plan before granting consent under this clause.



- (7) **Archaeological sites** The consent authority must, before granting consent under this clause to the carrying out of development on an archaeological site (other than land listed on the State Heritage Register or to which an interim heritage order under the <u>Heritage Act 1977</u> applies)—
  - (a) notify the Heritage Council of its intention to grant consent, and
  - (b) take into consideration any response received from the Heritage Council within 28 days after the notice is sent.
- (8) **Aboriginal places of heritage significance** The consent authority must, before granting consent under this clause to the carrying out of development in an Aboriginal place of heritage significance—
  - (a) consider the effect of the proposed development on the heritage significance of the place and any Aboriginal object known or reasonably likely to be located at the place by means of an adequate investigation and assessment (which may involve consideration of a heritage impact statement), and
  - (b) notify the local Aboriginal communities, in writing or in such other manner as may be appropriate, about the application and take into consideration any response received within 28 days after the notice is sent.
- (9) **Demolition of nominated State heritage items** The consent authority must, before granting consent under this clause for the demolition of a nominated State heritage item—
  - (a) notify the Heritage Council about the application, and
  - (b) take into consideration any response received from the Heritage Council within 28 days after the notice is sent.
- (10) **Conservation incentives** The consent authority may grant consent to development for any purpose of a building that is a heritage item or of the land on which such a building is erected, or for any purpose on an Aboriginal place of heritage significance, even though development for that purpose would otherwise not be allowed by this Plan, if the consent authority is satisfied that—
  - (a) the conservation of the heritage item or Aboriginal place of heritage significance is facilitated by the granting of consent, and
  - (b) the proposed development is in accordance with a heritage management document that has been approved by the consent authority, and
  - (c) the consent to the proposed development would require that all necessary conservation work identified in the heritage management document is carried out, and
  - (d) the proposed development would not adversely affect the heritage significance of the heritage item, including its setting, or the heritage significance of the Aboriginal place of heritage significance, and
  - (e) the proposed development would not have any significant adverse effect on the amenity of the surrounding area.



#### **State Environmental Planning Policies**

State Environmental Planning Policies (SEPPS) are part of the Environmental Planning and Assessment Act 1979, as noted earlier. Some of the SEPPs that may affect community land are included in this Appendix.

#### State Environmental Planning Policy (Resilience and Hazards) 2021 - Coastal Management

Chapter 2 (Coastal management) of this SEPP implements the objectives of the Coastal Management Act 2016 from a land use planning perspective, by specifying approval pathways and how development proposals are to be assessed if they fall within the coastal zone.

The SEPP promotes an integrated and coordinated approach to development assessment, with tailored development controls to ensure development proponents and consent authorities consider and address the most important issues for the coastal management area(s) their proposals fall within. The SEPP is supported by detailed mapping.

#### State Environmental Planning Policy (Transport and Infrastructure) 2021

The Transport and Infrastructure SEPP sets out the planning rules and controls for infrastructure, including listing development allowed with consent or without consent on community land.

State Environmental Planning Policy (Biodiversity and Conservation) 2021 – Chapter 2 Vegetation in non-rural areas

This policy deals with clearing of native vegetation in urban areas and land zoned for environmental protection.

# **Coastal Management Act 2016**

The *Coastal Management Act 2016* (the Act) establishes a strategic framework and objectives for managing coastal issues in NSW. The Act promotes strategic and integrated management, use and development of the coast for the social, cultural, and economic wellbeing of the people of NSW.

Council's supporting documents that represent Council's management approach to climate change and coastal land management are listed below:

Sustainable Wollongong 2030

Climate Change Mitigation Plan 2023 – 2030

Climate Change Adaptation Plan 2022

Wollongong CZMP Study 2017 and 2017 Action-Plan

In early 2022, Council began Stage 1 of the multi-year process to prepare a new Wollongong Coastal Management Program (CMP), in accordance with the NSW Coastal Management Framework, which will ultimately replace the 2017 Coastal Zone Management Plan. Stage 1 involved scoping the project and has resulted in a Scoping Study that sets the direction for the CMP. Stage 2 is underway, which involves a range of technical studies to fill the data gaps and inform the preparation of the CMP.

Coastal hazards that may need to be monitored and managed on Crown land and Council owned land include:



beach erosion

coastal and tidal inundation (flooding)

unstable coastal cliffs

unstable coastal lakes or watercourse entrances.

# **Coastal Crown Land Guidelines**

As required under the Coastal Crown Land Guidelines issued by DPE- Crown Lands in October 2023 (Coastal Crown Land Guidelines | Crown Lands), Council will continue through the NSW Coastal Management Framework to prepare a new Wollongong Coastal Management Program and have regard to the 5 Key principles of the Coastal Crown Land Guidelines as follows:

#### 1. Crown land management should align with Coastal Management Programs (CMPs)

- 1.1. Any CMP being prepared by a council in accordance with the *Coastal Management Act 2016*, should be referred to the department in draft form at key stages of its development and before the CMP is adopted by council.
- 1.2. Any CMP that proposes actions or activities to be carried out by the department or that proposes actions that relate to or affect Crown land, must be formally agreed to by the department before the CMP is submitted for certification.
- 1.3. If the department has agreed to a CMP action under the provisions of the Coastal Management Act, it is likely that it is broadly consistent with the objects of the *Crown Land Management Act 2016*. This means that the department's consideration of any directly related dealing or authorisation under the *Crown Land Management Act 2016* will be streamlined.
- 1.4. Dealings and approvals under the *Crown Land Management Act 2016* or the *Roads Act 1993* for coastal Crown land must have regard to and should be consistent with any relevant CMP. It is noted that the Department's website FAQ states that "Current tenures are not affected. The guidelines ensure that coastal risk is identified before tenures are issued and/or renewed, so that appropriate decisions can be made."
- 1.5. Any plan of management prepared with respect to coastal Crown land:
  - (a) must have regard to any relevant CMP, or in the absence of a CMP, the objects of the Coastal Management Act.
  - (b) should consider the coastal hazard and climate change risks that are relevant to coastal Crown land

It is noted this PoM meets guideline principle 1.5 through the existing 2017 Wollongong Coastal Zone Management Study and Action Plan and any future plan under the *Coastal Zone Management Act 2016* 

#### 2. Coastal hazard risks should be considered when issuing tenures over coastal Crown land

2.1. Any significant risks posed by coastal hazards, both now and in the future, including risks from climate change, should be considered before a tenure, for example a lease, license, permit or easement, is issued over coastal Crown land.



- 2.2. The terms and conditions of all tenures -including renewals over coastal Crown land are to be commensurate with the level of risk posed by coastal hazards, both now and in the future, including risks from climate change.
- 3. Coastal protection works on coastal Crown land on the open coast, should be low impact or nonstructural, where feasible or practicable
- 3.1. Low impact or non-structural measures that restore or enhance natural defences, for example foreshore realignment, dune or foreshore reshaping, beach scraping, vegetation management and habitat restoration, should be considered in the first instance to mitigate risks from coastal hazards.
- 3.2. Structural coastal protection works wholly or partly located on coastal Crown land on the open coast may only be considered if low impact or non-structural measures are not feasible or effective and only then if they are consistent with a relevant CMP.
- 4. Private structural coastal protection works on the open coast should be wholly located within the boundaries of the property the works are intended to protect
- 4.1. Private structural coastal protection works on the open coast should be contained wholly within the proponent's private freehold land unless extenuating circumstances apply.
- 4.2. Private structural coastal protection works, wholly or partly located on coastal Crown land, will only be considered when extenuating circumstances apply, that is, where:
  - (a) low impact or non-structural measures are not feasible or effective (refer Principle 3)
  - (b) they are consistent with a relevant CMP (refer Principle 1)
  - (c) historic, legacy issues will be addressed by the works
  - (d) there is a substantial public and/or environmental benefit to be derived from the works.
- 4.3. Landowner's consent that is being sought by a private proponent for a development application for structural coastal protection works, wholly or partly on Crown land on the open coast, will only be considered if the following conditions are met to the satisfaction of the department:
  - (a) the proponent can satisfy the conditions in clause 4.2
  - (b) the proponent agrees to enter into a deed of agreement which may cover, amongst other things, agreement to enter a tenure(s) subject to certain conditions and the creation of easements
  - (c) the proponent agrees to meet all the department's costs in relation to the deed of agreement
  - (d) the proponent agrees to pay all necessary costs for designing, seeking approval and constructing coastal protection works, including compensation for creation of easements and any other matter necessary to facilitate the structure for example, community engagement, Native Title compensation, Indigenous Land Use Agreements, section 24FA protection under the *Native Title* Act 1993 (Cth).
  - (e) the proponent agrees to indemnify the State of NSW from all liabilities associated with the works.
- 5. Non-Commercial dredging on coastal Crown land should be in the broader public and/or environmental interest



- **5.1**. The department may consider applications for non-commercial dredging works and/or undertake dredging, as required, to maintain navigation channels and harbour entrances, and/or to meet environmental, coastal management and beach renourishment needs.
- **5.2.** Dredging works must have regard to and should be consistent with any relevant coastal management program.
- **5.3**. Where the department has provided an approval for or undertaken non-commercial dredging in active marine margins, the spoil should, within practical limits, be returned for use within the active marine area of the coastal sediment compartment, with the highest priority accorded to use where beach nourishment is identified as an action in a relevant coastal management program.

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#### National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974

Statutory responsibilities on the council arising from this Act specifically relate to the protection of sites of pre- and post-European contact archaeological significance. This Act may affect any community land.

The objects of this Act are as follows—

- a. the conservation of nature, including, but not limited to, the conservation of
  - i. habitat, ecosystems and ecosystem processes, and
  - ii. biological diversity at the community, species and genetic levels, and
  - iii. landforms of significance, including geological features and processes, and
  - iv. landscapes and natural features of significance including wilderness and wild rivers,
- b. the conservation of objects, places or features (including biological diversity) of cultural value within the landscape, including, but not limited to
  - i. places, objects and features of significance to Aboriginal people, and
  - ii. places of social value to the people of New South Wales, and
  - iii. places of historic, architectural or scientific significance,
- c. fostering public appreciation, understanding and enjoyment of nature and cultural heritage and their conservation,
- d. providing for the management of land reserved under this Act in accordance with the management principles applicable for each type of reservation.
- (2) The objects of this Act are to be achieved by applying the principles of ecologically sustainable development.
- (3) In carrying out functions under this Act, the Minister, the Chief Executive and the Service are to give effect to the following
  - i. the objects of this Act,
  - ii. the public interest in the protection of the values for which land is reserved under this Act and the appropriate management of those lands.

#### Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit to Implement the Hill 60 Master Plan

Council has an existing Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit under the *NPWS Act 1974* to implement the Landscape Master Plan. During the pre-draft consultation related to Council's consideration of applying the Area of Cultural Significance Community Land Category to most of the land under this PoM, the following comment was received from Heritage NSW (the NSW Government authority who administers the NPWS Act on behalf of the Minister). It demonstrates the ongoing requirement for all possible uses, developments, activities to be consistent with this legislation and any AHIP (and any approval under the *Heritage Act 1977*) that applies to the land under this PoM.

#### 11 March 2024 Heritage NSW Staff feedback summary

"We support the application of "Community land category" of "Area of Cultural Significance" categories to the majority of the Hill 60 area, noting the significant Aboriginal cultural heritage values of this land that are reflected in the State Heritage Register listing. As you know, an Aboriginal Heritage Impact Permit



(AHIP) is currently in place for Hill 60. Any actions required under the proposed Plan of Management need to be consistent with the approved actions under the AHIP. If Council seeks to change any of the approved activities under the AHIP then an AHIP variation application needs to be submitted to Heritage NSW. 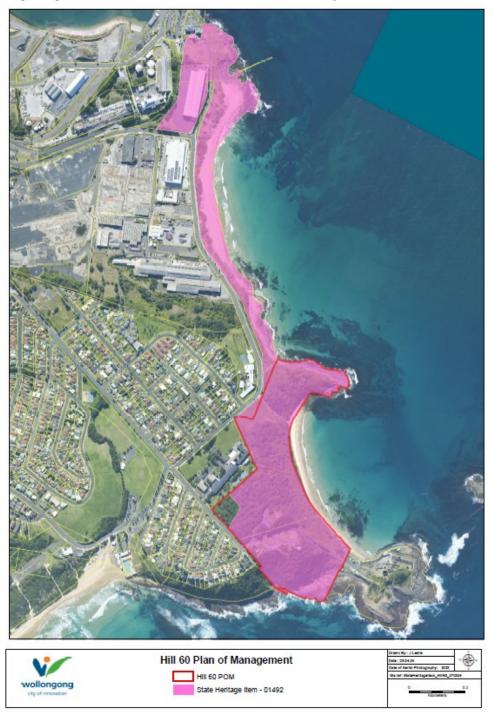

#### State Emergency and Rescue Management Act 1989

#### State Emergency and Rescue Management Act 1989

This Act defines Emergency Services Organisations and is listed here as one of the occupiers of land within the PoM area is an emergency service organisation.

#### **Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016**

**Note:** This Act repealed several pieces of legislation including the *Native Vegetation Act 2003*, *Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995*, the *Nature Conservation Trust Act 2001*, and the animal and plant provisions of the *National Parks and Wildlife Act 1974*.

This Act covers conservation of threatened species, populations and ecological communities, the protection of native flora and fauna. This Act primarily relates to community land categorised as natural area. However, other categories may also be affected.

The *Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995* has been repealed and superseded by the *Biodiversity Conservation Act 2016*. However, references to the former legislation remain in the LG Act and are therefore retained in this guideline.

DCCEEW's (Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water) Environment and Heritage division advises that recovery plans and threat abatement plans made under the *Threatened Species Conservation Act 1995* were repealed on the commencement of the *Biodiversity Conservation Act* in 2017. These plans have not been preserved by any savings and transitional arrangement under the Biodiversity Conservation Act or LG Act, meaning pre-existing plans have no legal effect.

For this reason, requirements relating to recovery plans and threat abatement plans for local councils preparing plans of management under section 36B of the LG Act are now redundant. Councils will be advised if future amendments are made to the LG Act to enable these mechanisms.

Certain weeds are also declared noxious under this Act, which prescribes categories to which the weeds are assigned, and these control categories identify the course of action which needs to be carried out on the weeds. A weed may be declared noxious in part or all of the state.

#### **Fisheries Management Act 1994**

The Fisheries Management Act 1994 (FM Act) includes provisions for the management of state fisheries, including the conservation of fish habitats, threatened species, populations and ecological communities of fish and marine vegetation and management of the riparian zone, waterways and threatened marine/freshwater aquatic species. This relates to community land categorised as natural area (foreshore, watercourse or wetland).

Where an area of community land is declared to be critical habitat, or if that area is affected by a recovery plan or threat abatement plan under Part 7A of the FM Act, a site-specific plan of management will need to be undertaken.

#### **Rural Fires Act 1997**

This Act contains provisions for bushfire risk management and the establishment of a Bushfire Management Committee. It also includes direction on development in bushfire prone lands.



#### Heritage Act 1977

This Act contains provisions for the conservation of items of heritage and may relate to any community land. State Heritage Items are to be managed in accordance with this legislation and its regulations, including minimum standards of care.

The objects of this Act are as follows—

- a. to promote an understanding of the State's heritage,
- b. to encourage the conservation of the State's heritage,
- c. to provide for the identification and registration of items of State heritage significance,
- d. to provide for the interim protection of items of State heritage significance,
- e. to encourage the adaptive reuse of items of State heritage significance,
- f. to constitute the Heritage Council of New South Wales and confer on it functions relating to the State's heritage,
- g. to assist owners with the conservation of items of State heritage significance.

When an interim heritage order or listing on the State Heritage Register applies to a place, building, work, relic, moveable object, precinct or land, a person will need an approval under this Act to do certain things like, but not limited to, demolish a building, carry out any development on the land, (see section 57 of the Act)

Under this Act the Minister can make interim heritage orders for items of State or local heritage significance. Council also has delegation to issue interim heritage orders under certain circumstances

#### **Commonwealth legislation**

#### Environmental Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Management Act 1999

This Act enables the Australian Government to join with the states and territories in providing a national scheme of environment and heritage protection and biodiversity conservation. It incorporates threatened species on a national level and with relevance to Matters of National Environmental Significance.

#### **Telecommunications Act 1997**

This Act provides for telecommunication facilities being permitted on community land without authorisation in a PoM.

# Consultation Plan – July 2023 – Engagement informs 2024 Hill 60 MP Project



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#### Accessible Viewing Area Project - Consultation Plan - July 2023 and Conversation Snapshot Explanation

At the time of making this PoM, in accordance with obtained legislative approvals, **the Accessible Viewing Area project** was under way in March 2024 and completed in December 2024. The project implements part of the 2015 Master Plan. The 2024 completed project was informed by consideration of feedback on the July 2023 Consultation Plan as noted in the Conversation Snapshot document posted on Council's website in August 2023. The *Conversation Snapshot* document is on the next few pages.

#### Works completed included:

- New position of entry gate to close car parking sunrise to sunset
- Weed removal and replace with native planting
- Feature paving on alignment of underground tunnel
- New Entry to Marine Rescue Building and car park
- New Accessible Parking
- New Accessible viewing area with Balustrade

# Conversation Snapshot – What we heard in 2023 and how it shaped 2024 works



# Hill 60 Accessibility and Viewing Area Upgrade Conversation Snapshot

Here's a summary of what we heard and how it was considered in finalising the upgrade plan.

#### Operation of the Marine Rescue NSW facility

#### We heard

Marine Rescue NSW requested wider driveaway access to their building and compound to accommodate their vehicles. They also asked for management of surrounding vegetation to reduce the risk of fires impacting on their operations and on the building. They also asked if Council could put in place a licence agreement as it expired many years ago.

#### How it was used

We modified the driveway design to make it wider to accommodate vehicles being used by Marine Rescue NSW. We have established a 5-metre asset protection zone around the building and will engage contractors to undertake hazard reduction.

#### Impacts of hang gliding and paragliding activities

#### We heard

Gliding pilots were concerned about the location of the new balustrading and their take offs from the headland. They also asked if Council could remove or trim vegetation on the headland slope as pilots were concerned about hitting these on take-off.

#### How it was used

We have shortened the length of the balustrade by a few metres to reduce the risk of gliders contacting it on take-off. We will not remove trees or trim tops of trees and shrubs as vegetation is being managed to protect habitat and biodiversity under a Vegetation Management Plan. We will undertake weed control on the headland. We will fill in the uneven ground on the grassed area near the take-off area to improve access and safety.

#### Future of the military tunnels

#### We heard

People wanted to know what Council was doing about restoring the tunnels and opening safe access to them. People were interested in the military history of the site and saw the area as being a tourist destination with a lot to offer visitors.

#### How it was used

Council is investigating options for the future management of the tunnels and has commissioned a report by specialist architects. At this stage the tunnels will remain closed and graffiti on the outside of the tunnels will be removed periodically.

## Aboriginal cultural significance

People commented about the significance of Hill 60 to Aboriginal people and this being important to recognise in the upgrade works and the signage and artwork. They wanted to be assured we were working in consultation with Aboriginal stakeholders on the upgrade plans and would recognise the displacement of people living on the hill when the military came.

#### How it was used

Our consultation with Aboriginal stakeholders is ongoing through all stages of implementing the Hill 60 Landscape Master Plan that covers the area from MM Beach to Hill 60 Headland. Conversations about the content for the signage and artwork for Stage 1 are continuing.

#### **Traffic issues**

#### We heard

The issue of speeding vehicles heading up Military Rd to Hill 60 was raised, with the lack of a footpath posing a safety risk to pedestrians. It was suggested that traffic calming is needed, given its proximity to the school, lack of safe pedestrian access and traffic volumes. Clear signage is needed to indicate carparks are shared zones to improve pedestrian safety. A bike rack was also requested.

The request for a footpath along Military Road from Dovers Drive to continue towards Hill 60 has been added to our request list for consideration. A shared path along Military Road, between Church St and Olympic Boulevard will be constructed within the next 2 years.

We monitor traffic volume and speed across Wollongong to help plan for traffic calming measures like speed humps. We will prioritise traffic counts along Military Rd to capture data so we can consider it in our overall priorities for new traffic calming measures across the whole local government area.

A bike rack will be installed in a future stage of the upgrade.

# **Vegetation Management**

Concerns were raised about fire threat from headland vegetation on both the western side adjacent to Five Islands College and on the eastern slopes posing a risk to the Marine Rescue building. There was a request for any new landscape plantings to be Illawarra native species. Residents also want to see continuing efforts to control weeds. There were calls for vegetation removal/pruning/weed control to provide better access to views and to provide ongoing resourcing of this work. There was a concern about Council opening more tracks on the hill or in nearby areas. It was suggested this would cause damage to vegetation and habitat as well as see more rubbish dumped across the area by people using tracks.

#### How it was used

Asset protection zones have been established adjacent to Five Islands High and the Marine Rescue NSW building with hazard reduction works to be done, including weed control. There will be some trimming of trees and shrubs to open historic views to the south and north on the headland that are now obscured by vegetation. Council will not open more tracks as this area has heritage protection in place with ground disturbance to be avoided or limited to areas already developed, such as existing carparks.

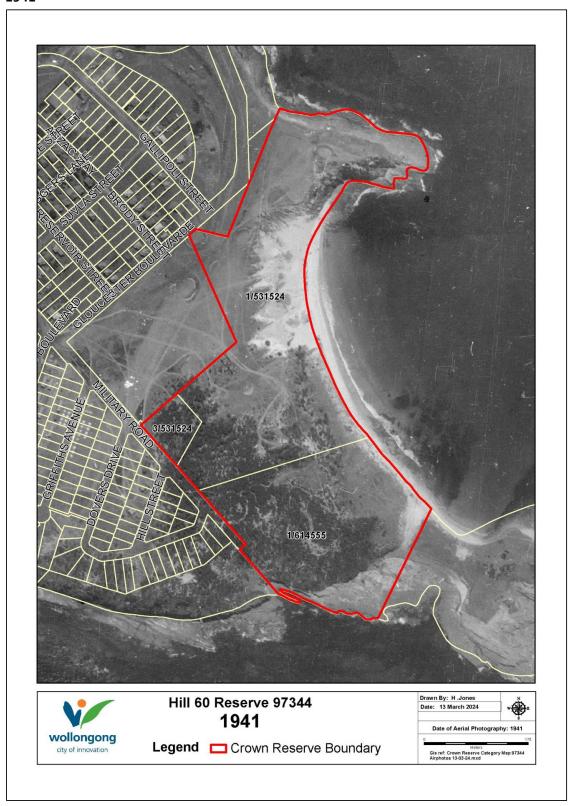
# What happens next:

We will provide a further update prior to work commencing.

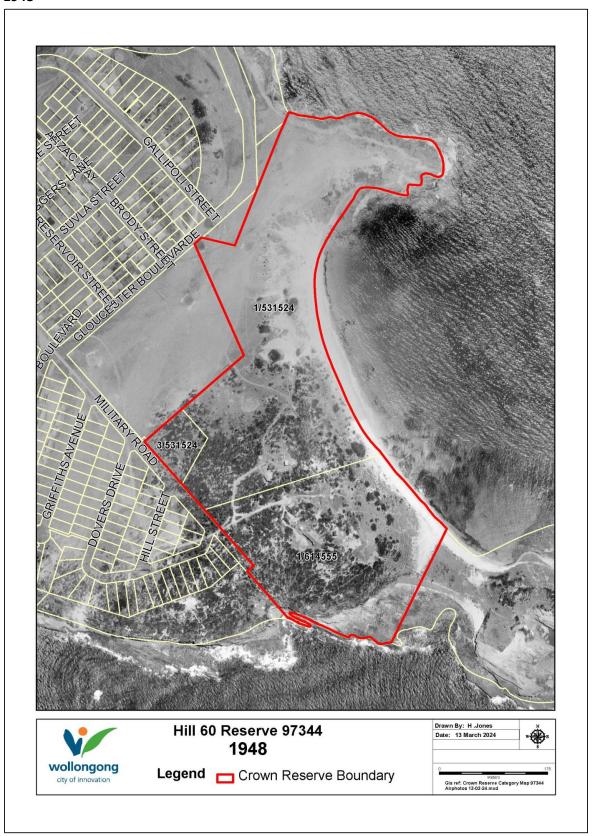


# Hill 60 PoM Appendix – Aerial Photography Records 1941 – 2020



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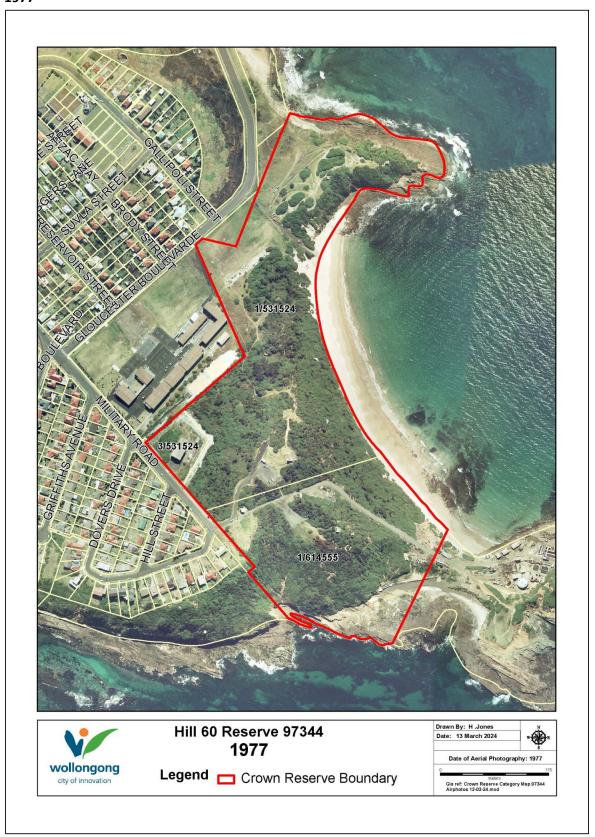
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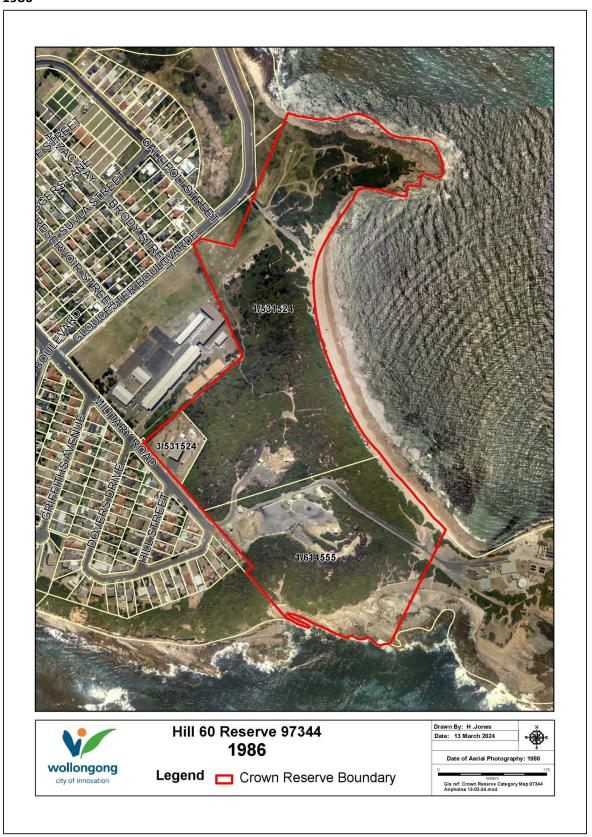
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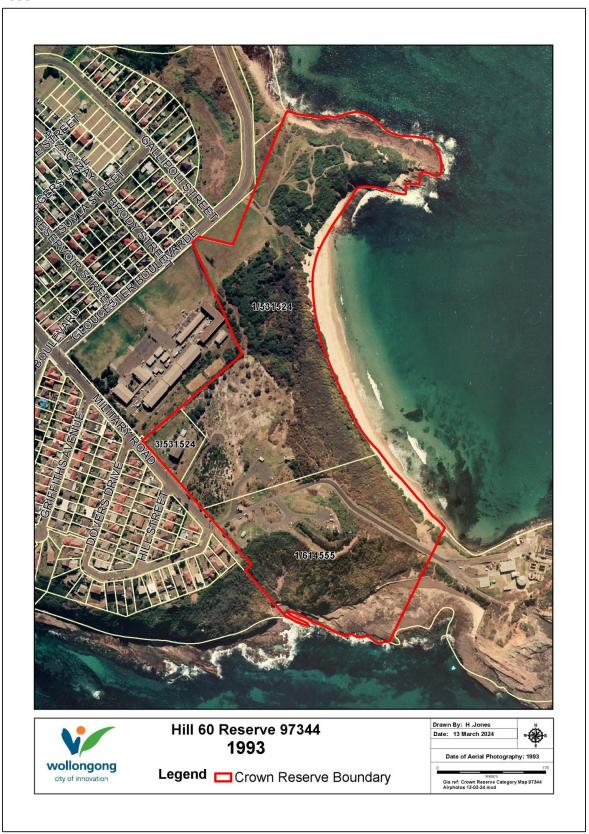
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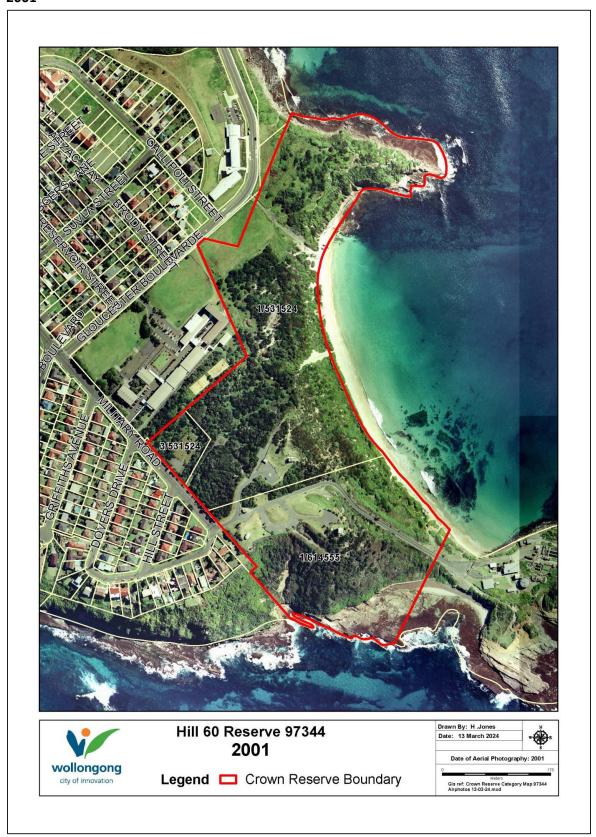
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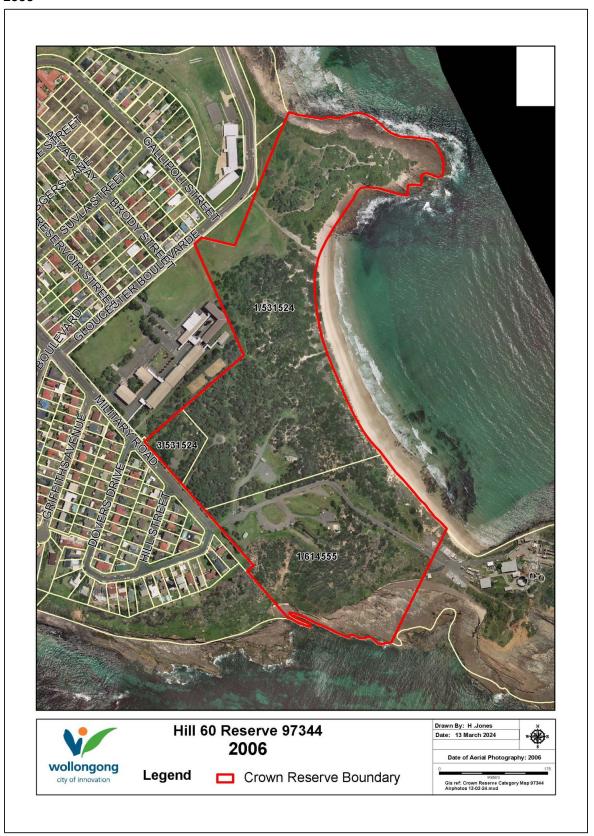
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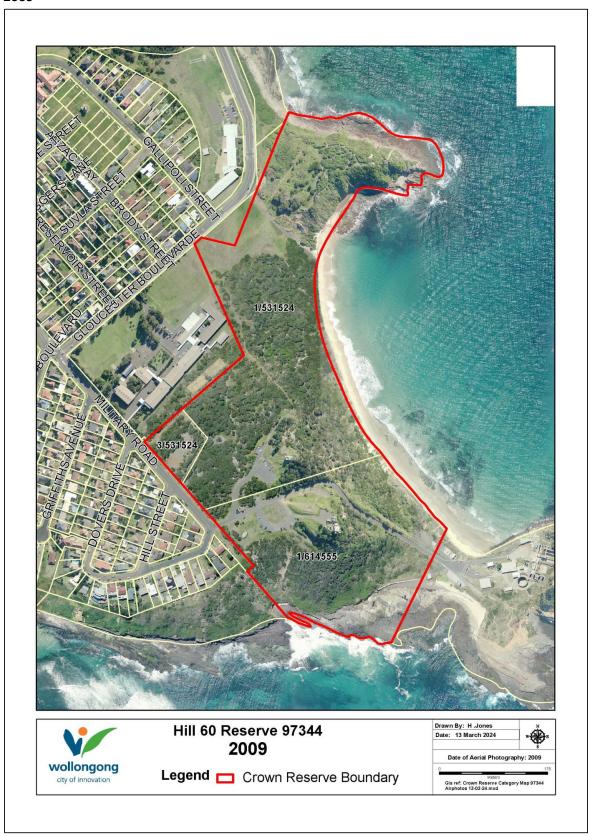
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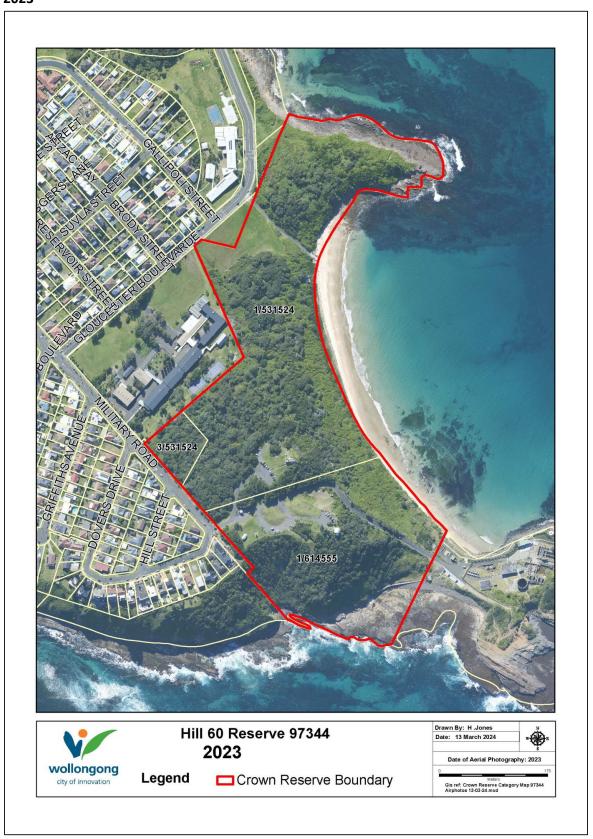
